### **FROM THE PASTOR**

In a little over a month, I get the honor of accompanying 12 of our youth to Heifer Ranch International in Perryville, Arkansas for our yearly youth mission trip. I think the yearly mission trip that our youth take is one of the most significant ministries that happen at RPC. Thanks to your contributions our young people have the opportunity to learn more about the world around them and discover what it means in concrete ways to be a Christian.

I have long been acquainted with Heifer International. I find it a great mission for children and youth to understand. Heifer International's mission is to work with communities to end world hunger and poverty. They also emphasize care for the Earth.

Dan West was the founder of Heifer. He was a farmer from the American Midwest and a member of the Church of the Brethren who went to the front lines of the Spanish Civil War as an aid worker. His mission was to provide relief, but he soon discovered the meager single cup of milk rationed to the weary refugees once a day was not enough. And then he had a thought: What if they had not a cup, but a cow?

That "teach a man to fish" philosophy is what drove West to found Heifer International. And now, nearly 70 years later, that philosophy still inspires the work of Heifer. Heifer empowers families to turn hunger and poverty into hope and prosperity – but their approach is more than just giving them a handout. Heifer links communities and helps bring sustainable agriculture and commerce to areas with a long history of poverty. The animals that are sent provide partners with both food and reliable income, as agricultural products such as milk, eggs, and honey can be traded or sold at market.

When many families gain this new sustainable income, it brings new opportunities for building schools, creating agricultural cooperatives, forming community savings and funding small businesses.

Our young people will spend five nights at the ranch learning about world hunger, sustainability issues, and spending time on the working farm. In addition to me, our adult chaperones are Ellen Hamilton, Matt Lisle, and Lisa Aulerich-Marciniak. The youth have had a hand full of fundraisers already this year with a goal to raise all the money needed. You may wonder why we are trying to raise all the money instead of expecting the parents to pay a significant share as they have in the past. After last year several parents approached me concerned about the cost of the trip, with several families sending two young people some parents were spending close to \$1,000. The Christian Education Committee believes that everyone should have the opportunity to serve, so we started raising funds, and we have raised a significant amount of money, more than half of what we need. If you would like to help us reach our goal, there are ways you can be involved.

Friday, May 5th is the Adult Mission Trip Fundraiser hosted by Tara and Dan Gregus. Tickets are only \$35 per person. It is a Cinco De Mayo party!!

Sunday, May 21st following worship the Youth will be serving a Mimosa Brunch. Casseroles, home baked goods, fruits, juice, and coffee are on the menu. Plan to stay after church and support the youth with a

donation.

And you can always make a monetary donation to help our young people attend Heifer, simply make your check payable to RPC with a Youth Mission Trip note in the memo line and drop it in the offering plate.

You have the power to change a young person's life forever.

**HUMAN SCENE** — Join us in the Parlor at 8:30 am every Sunday as Human Scene features a series of TED Talks on a variety of subjects. We will reflect on these stories through the lens of our Christian faith.

**May 7** – Foreign policy strategist David Rothkopf offers insights into the topic “How fear drives American politics.” We discuss ways in which the Christian message can offer a counterweight to the politics of fear and seek ways in which RPC can be a center for or instigator of conversations that provide this counterweight.

**May 14** – New York Times columnist and author Anand Giridharadas tells us of two persons who represent cultures in conflict in “A tale of two Americas and the mini mart where they collided.” It’s a story of second chances. We will reflect on the role of second chances in our own lives and ask if there are those whom we know to be in need of second chances that we might help give them.

**May 21** – Peace-builder Scilla Elworthy, founder of the Oxford Research Group that seeks to promote effective dialogue between nuclear-weapons policymakers and their opponents, speaks on “Fighting with nonviolence.” We ask, “Can we become self-reflective enough to commit ourselves to the nonviolent resolution of conflicts?”

**May 28** – Continuing our focus on nonviolent conflict resolution, we hear from peacemaker Jamila Raqib, “The secret to effective nonviolent resistance.” We ask, “In relation to what issue(s) could RPC be active in this way? What situations within our sphere of influence could we affect positively through applying these ideas?”

**ALL CHURCH COMMITTEE MEETINGS** — The first of the year the Session committed to move the majority of committee meetings to the first Sunday of the Month. One of the main reasons for the change was to aid in communication. We have also discovered that meeting together provided great energy and enthusiasm!
