Build a Better Mouse Trap?

It's the middle of summertime and church attendance is down. This might cause one to wonder. What might we do to improve our worship attendance?

The old saying, "build a better mousetrap and the world will beat a path to your door" is relevant. Perhaps in 1870, before the onset of powerful mass media, Ralph Waldo Emerson's notion was closer to the truth. But, as modern marketing folks will tell you, what sells is often not the best product, but the product that gets the best marketing.



I am keenly aware that Sally spends many hours practicing music and exploring new possibilities for the music ministry. Likewise Jenny spends many hours developing great kids' programs with top notch teachers and exciting curriculum. And, I spend many hours every week thinking about the scriptures and how they apply to our lives, so that I can preach a solid, Biblically-based, culturally-relevant sermon.

It's possible to look at these three efforts, as well as the efforts of many volunteers, and decide that the church just needs to build a better mousetrap. Perhaps if the ushers did a better job of smiling and making conversation with visitors, perhaps if the pastor administered the sacraments in a more graceful manner, perhaps if the kids had a better kids' bulletin, perhaps if the music was playing a different style perhaps there would be more people. Maybe.

I think it's more likely that we could improve our attendance, not by producing a better product, but by improving our marketing.

Since the days of Jesus himself, the primary driver of increased Church attendance has always been word-of-mouth invitations to friends and family. Church growth depends on this factor more than everything else combined.

Now, you might be thinking, "but it isn't very comfortable to invite my friends to church—they may not like it, and then they will not value my suggestions in the future." It's only natural to limit such invitations to persons whom you think have a reasonably good chance of appreciating our efforts.

But, what if you look at your friends and family and say, "None of them has any probable hope of liking my church." In that case, my recommendation would be to ask yourself, what could the church do differently that would cause those people to want to attend?

So, here's your homework. Invite two people to church sometime in the next two months. And if you find that's too risky, then you can substitute this assignment. Think of something we might do differently that would make you say, "Wow, now I can invite so-and-so to church." Then, write me an email or give me a call and let me know your idea. I can't guarantee that the church will have the resources to implement every possible idea, but I can guarantee that I will consider your thoughts carefully.

August 11—Impact of School-Based Health Centers on Medical Reform

Stephen Bord LCSW, and *Mary C. Crang* FNP from the University of Illinois at Chicago Health Services reveal how school-based health centers, which have been in the Chicago region for the past 20 years, and largely in underserved communities, will impact medical reform in the coming era of Obama-Care.


