At the Session meeting on Wednesday evening the Session continued to discuss how and when we can resume in person worship. For the time being we will continue to worship “virtually.” When the state of Illinois and CDC indicate it is safe for groups of up to 50 to meet, we will begin offering in person worship as well as live streaming worship. One of the things we have learned during this strange time is that having a worship service online is a wonderful outreach to the community and a gift to members who travel or are unable to attend worship in person. So, live streaming worship will become part of our ongoing ministry beyond the pandemic. When we begin worshipping in person, we know that it will be different. Until it has been determined to be safe, worshippers will be required to wear masks and observe social distancing. But we have also learned that we are an adaptable people! At the request of the Session I am forming a Task Force to plan all aspects of moving to in person worship (when it is safe to do so), if you have interest in serving on the task force please reach out to me. Currently the building remains closed, which means no in person committee meetings.



On Sunday, May 31 we will celebrate Pentecost. As part of our worship we will have virtual communion. An excerpt from the *Companion to the Book of Common Worship* says: *According to the Day of Pentecost story in Acts 2:1-13, God gave the gift of the Holy Spirit to empower witnesses to the resurrection. The Spirit is the “unseenness of God” working among us. Without the gift of the Spirit, Christ’s church dries up and withers away, and we are left with only our broken selves. With the gift of the Spirit, all things are possible. A spirit-filled community of faith opens eyes to needs in the world and sees its missing as God’s new people. The Day of Pentecost is the climax of the Great Fifty Days of Easter, celebrating as it does the gift of the Spirit to the body of Christ — the church.*

What kind of bread should we use? Our Directory for Worship says: “Sacraments are signs of the real presence and power of Christ in the Church, symbols of God’s action.” *The communion bread should convey fullness — in other words, it should be big enough to hint at the abundance of God’s love, and to suggest that it can satisfy the hunger of body and spirit. The taste or goodness of the bread matters too! Traditionally, wheat bread has been used among Western Christians; however, simple bread made from maize, rice or barley would be perfectly appropriate in other cultural contexts. Whatever the case, the communion bread ought to be delicious, appetizing, inviting, even slightly sweet.* Ultimately the kind of bread does not matter, as long as the bread (and beverage) that are used remind you of the fullness and grace of God. On Pentecost I suggest you throw a birthday party for the church at your home and for communion feel free to use bread, crackers or even birthday cake!

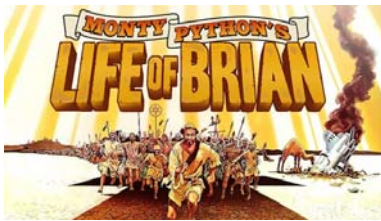
