In response to the particular issues surrounding teenage girls today, RPC announces the first ever all girls' group. The group's focus will be on encouraging girls to live healthy, spirit-filled lives—appreciating their unique gifts and cultivating meaningful relationships.

The group will meet on Wednesday evenings, beginning October 1 in the Celestial Cinema, from 6:45 to 7:45 p.m. for eight weeks. As part of my internship here, I will lead the group, along with my faithful volunteer, Marcy Dunne, an experienced youth counselor at First Presbyterian of La Grange. The group will involve activities, discussion, guest speakers, movies and more. Topics of interest will include: Managing Stress: Body, Mind and Spirit, Mythology and the teenage girl, Self Image and the Media, and Youth on the Street. While many activities are planned, we will use the girls' input to shape our program.

Session News

During September the Session:

- ♦ met with two members of the Committee on Ministry of Chicago Presbytery, without the pastor's presence, for a triennial visit to review activities and concerns of RPC. Topics such as worship, interaction with the local community, mission activities, financial concerns and stewardship were discussed.
- ♦ learned of the exciting plans by the deacons to organize flood relief volunteers to work in Riverside and surrounding communities, in cooperation with village authorities.
- ♦ approved a request for the baptism of Luke Christopher Staibus on September 21.
- ♦ affirmed the policy that the sacrament of baptism is open to children when at least one parent is a member of RPC, or is an active member of another Christian church, subject to session approval. Baptisms must take place during a regular worship service.
- ♦ authorized the Pastor to officiate at weddings he/she deems to be appropriate and that are done in accordance with the Book of Order requirements, without the need for prior session approval.
- ♦ approved plans for an "Every Member Canvass" in conjunction with the fall pledge drive.
- ♦ learned that the budget deficit has been slightly reduced, but is still around \$30,000.
- ♦ discussed the possibility of allowing alcoholic beverages to be served at functions held at RPC. Further research as to the implications of this will be conducted.
- ♦ approved vacation leave for Rev. Jansen from October 25 to October 31. Our seminary intern, Mary Koon, will lead worship on October 26.
- ♦ discussed the advisability of making access to the online **Vision** password-protected, as a safeguard against making members' phone numbers and photos of children available to the internet at large. It was decided that this was not a necessary precaution.
- ♦ learned that Mary Morrison, pastor of the Berwyn Presbyterian Church, has approached Rev. Jansen about the possibility of a formal merger of that church with RPC. Such a merger is a very complicated procedure with many ramifications for both churches. More information will be gathered before the session discusses this further and makes any recommendation to the congregation.

Presbyterians at Work

On Saturday, August 23, nine RPC members traveled to Rockford, Illinois, to work on a Habitat for Humanity worksite. HFH is a Christian organization whose mission is to provide affordable housing for deserving low income families. Using volunteer labor, they build houses that are sold at cost to families who must volunteer on other houses before getting their own. Our group, consisting of Pastor Scott Jansen, Mary Jansen, Lou Heine, Mike Heine, Bill and Colleen Muller, Doris Hayes, Fred Mitchell, and Diane Chaney did finish work on a house that's very near completion—sanding, sealing, painting and varnishing of trim work inside and outside of the house. In a few hours, we accomplished a lot and had a great time. We're hopeful this will be the first of many such adult mission trips!



Flood Relief

The severe flooding of the Des Plaines River on Saturday, September 13, prompted the deacons to cancel the Benton Harbor, Michigan Habitat for Humanity trip scheduled for September 20, and divert our energies to flood relief efforts in Riverside and surrounding communities. 400 residents were evacuated in this area early Saturday morning, and some could not return to their homes for days, due to lack of electricity. Basements and first floors were flooded in homes near the river, leaving behind an incredible mess.

Riverside Presbyterian Church is responding in an effort to help those persons who have been hard hit, to contact them, hear their stories, and provide labor for the clean-up process. We helped 5 families during the weekend of September 20-21, and have received word of seven more who could use help.

Peacemaking Offering ♦ October 5, 2008 ♦ World Communion Sunday

Every year our congregation joins Christians around the world in celebrating World Communion Sunday. Born in a time of international unrest as nations were about to enter another world war, World Communion Sunday's central focus is the Lord's Supper instituted by Christ and its unifying message for all who partake of it. We are one in Christ Jesus, and not to be separated by the nations, ethnic groups, or denominations we belong to, or for any other reason.

The Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) also marks the day by a call to peacemaking, urging us to be followers of the Prince of Peace. One concrete way that we do that is by receiving the Peacemaking Offering. Through this special offering, we work together with others in our presbytery, our synod, and nationally through the General Assembly's Peacemaking Program to learn and live out the ways of peace.

The Peacemaking Offering invites each congregation to find ways to promote peace within the congregation and within the community. For that reason, our church will retain twenty-five percent of the Offering we receive, and we will decide how best to put this money to work. Another 25 percent goes to our presbytery or synod, and the remaining 50 percent goes to the General Assembly for peacemaking involvement throughout the world. Join us on October 5 to celebrate World Communion Sunday and to commit ourselves to working for the unity of the church and the peace of Christ. The Fellowship Committee is not always aware of who is using the Social Hall and what supplies they need. We have had several instances of thinking that the cupboards were well stocked, only to find out that things were gone at our next event. We are here to serve the Fellowship needs of all of our church groups, and we can best do this if your group keeps us informed.

We are often blessed to find that members of the congregation have generously donated items to the kitchen or Social Hall for use by the church. People have graciously given everything from coffee supplies to appliances. With church finances being tight, we are especially grateful for these gifts. If you wish to donate an item, please either leave it with a note on the counter in the kitchen, or put it with other like items in the cabinets. This will assure us that it is meant to be used by everyone and wasn’t brought for any particular event or forgotten by someone using the space. If you are donating groceries of any kind, please make sure they are labeled for use (there are stickers and pens on the counter next to the refrigerator), and left in the kitchen. **Please do not leave any food, especially open crackers or cookies, in the cabinets in the Social Hall.** Too often no one finds these items and we end up throwing them away because they’ve become stale.

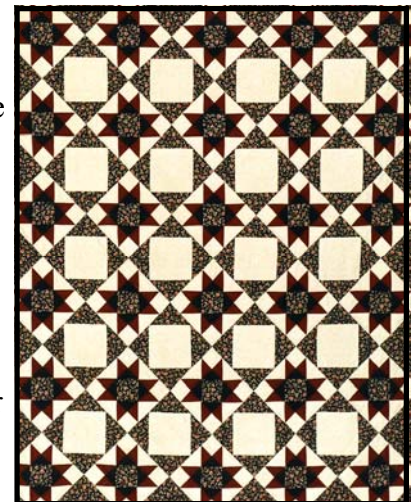

The Nominating Committee is beginning the process of recruiting nominees for church officer positions for 3-year terms beginning in January 2009, and a new Nominating Committee to serve a 1-year term. If you are interested in serving as a church officer, or if you would like to nominate fellow members, please complete the form below and return it to a Nominating Committee member, to the church office, or place it in the offering plate. It is the goal of the Nominating Committee to include as many people as possible in the process, and to recruit officers from all constituencies within our congregation. To assist you, a description of each position is included below. Your input is appreciated, and we encourage you to consider nominating yourself as well as a fellow church member!

ELDERS

Elders sit on the 18-member Board of Session. The Session is responsible for overseeing all aspects of the Church: worship, mission, Christian education, youth, stewardship, finance, physical plant, personnel and fellowship. Elders meet on the third Wednesday evening of each month for approximately 2 hours. Each Elder serves as chair or a member of a church committee. Committee meetings are held as needed, often on a monthly basis. Elders may participate in Sunday morning worship as the liturgist and when the worship service includes Communion, several Elders will participate as servers.

DEACONS

The Board of Deacons consists of 18 members who meet the third Tuesday evening of each month. The Deacons’ primary focus is on care and support of members of the congregation and the greater community. They are commissioned to visit the sick, befriend the stranger and help the elderly. Each deacon is responsible for keeping in contact with his district members on an as-needed basis by making home visits, phone calls and sending cards or notes by mail. The deacons communicate the needs and concerns of the members to the pastor and other members of the church staff. Deacons are also directly involved with service of Communion, including preparation of the elements and clean-up. They deliver flowers to those who are sick, home-bound or celebrating special events, promote mission opportunities and lead monthly worship services at the British Home.

TRUSTEES

The 12-member Board of Trustees is responsible for maintaining the condition and functioning of the physical plant of the church. The Board of Trustees meets for about 1.5 hours the second Monday evening of each month to discuss and act upon business related to building improvements, repairs and maintenance. Trustees make decisions within a budget, and under the final approval of the Session. In addition, each trustee is expected to fulfill “Trustee of the Month” duties. During that month, the trustee is responsible for unlocking the church facilities on Sunday mornings prior to Christian Education activities and locking up after church activities are completed. The church employs a part-time custodian, a part-time building supervisor, and landscaping contractors to perform many required duties. However, “hands-on” work by the trustees is often necessary to bridge the gap between necessity and available budget.

NOMINATING COMMITTEE

The Nominating Committee consists of 5-7 members who recruit individuals to serve as church officers. The bulk of the Committee’s work takes place in October and November. The Nominating Committee may meet at other times during the year to find replacements for church officers who vacate their positions before the end of their term. In addition, in those years when there is a change in pastoral leadership within the church, they are responsible for nominating a search committee. After the Nominating Committee creates a slate of candidates for church offices, a congregational meeting is held to approve or reject nominees.

ENDOWMENT COMMITTEE

The Endowment Committee consists of 9 members (4 members-at-large, the financial secretary, the treasurer, 2 elders and 2 trustees). Each year, one new at-large member is added for a 4-year term. The committee monitors the church’s financial endowment in a prudent and fiduciary manner, meeting at least quarterly. Members should feel somewhat comfortable with financial investments and the financial needs of the church.
