God With Us

What makes for a good Christmas season for you?

Most mature folks want some form of strengthened relationships. A good Christmas means quality time with family, or peace in the world, or reconciliation with an enemy, or getting along well with fellow employees at work, or everyone just making an effort to be nice for awhile.



At least, that would be my answer. If I could make each relationship in my life a little deeper, a little more cooperative, a little more open, a little more loving, I'd be a happy camper at Christmas. But how do we do this? Systems theories show that webs of relationships tend to establish certain routines and attitudes, and that one small change in just one point in that web will have a profound effect on the entire web.

It's easier to change your world than you might imagine. You just have to accept one very difficult truth—**you** have to take responsibility for the change. If you sit around and wait for others to change so that your life will become better, it will probably never happen. You have to be the one to make that initial change, and then you can watch and enjoy the ripple effects on those around you.

What does this have to do with Christmas? Shouldn't a pastor be talking about God and Jesus in a column about Christmas? Well, I believe this has EVERYTHING to do with God and Jesus. What did God want for Christmas two thousand years ago? God wanted better relationships with the ones who were most significant in God's world. And what did God do about it? God didn't sit around and wait for us humans to change our ways. God sent Jesus to show us what true reconciliation of relationships looks like. God took the initiative, and changed the world.

This Christmas Season, I encourage you to take some initiative and change the world for the better. It doesn't have to be miraculous. It doesn't have to be an extraordinary feat of power. Just do one humble thing—as humble as laying a child down in a pile of straw that's been bunched up in a donkey's feeding trough. Do one small thing to make your relationships better. And while you are doing it, remember that the Spirit of God lives inside of you. God is calling you to follow God's example, for this truly is what Christmas is all about. Jesus Christ was called "Emmanuel" in Hebrew (meaning "God with us"). If you want your Christmas to be deeply religious, to feel like you are in harmony with God's grand and glorious reign over the universe, then follow God's example and do one small thing to improve the relationships in your world. Do it in the name of Jesus Christ.

What shall you do? I can't say. Jesus improved relationships by finding where others were hurting and seeking to heal those problems. He also sought to increase mutual understanding of different people because better understanding generally leads to better relationships. So you might learn something about those around you, or about God. Or you might serve the needs of others, or of God. Whatever you do, make sure you consciously recognize that it is the Spirit of "God With Us" that is inspiring your action.

Our December Work Day has been deferred to Sunday, January 4, from 1:00 to 3:00. Please come—it is always a wonderful church family fellowship opportunity!

We are continuing our “green” initiative. As the Fellowship Committee continues its effort to use our china collection instead of disposable cups, we have responded to their dishwashing needs with a more economical water heating system. The previous system used water heated from a central point in the church, requiring water to run for a long time before hot water was available. This also required circulating heated water throughout the whole church when it was needed only for one area. One water heater failed this fall. Last month a “point of use” instant water heater was installed for the church kitchen. This heats the water for the faucets and the dishwasher instantly, saving water and natural gas!

CARERS Committee

Three collections will take place this month:

- ◆ For the residents of Interfaith House, gifts will be brought to the CARERS Giving Christmas Tree in the Social Hall. From November 30 until December 21, the tree will be decorated with paper ornaments, each listing specific clothing items and sizes needed. If you are able to participate, please take an ornament, buy the item specified, and place it under the tree in the Social Hall. These gifts will be given to the people at Interfaith House who are recovering from a recent illness or hospitalization and have nowhere to go. Interfaith House provides a temporary home for up to 60 adults with a 6 weeks duration. The staff provides trips to doctors, nourishing food, contact with social services and counseling. They have an 85 per cent success rate in locating suitable work and housing for these formerly homeless individuals who need help and a means to begin again. Thanks to Wilma Steenland and Monica Wood who will sort and deliver these gifts.
- ◆ First Presbyterian Church of Chicago will receive the gifts of *canned meats* which will be collected during the entire month of December.
- ◆ Stars and Stripes are asking for wrapped hard candy for servicemen for Christmas.

Ministers of Care are very grateful for all the fine support given each month. Thank you one and all.

Session News

At its November meeting, the Session spent extra time discussing two items of special concern, membership and finances.

Membership:

One of the duties of the Session, according to the Presbyterian Book of Order, is to review the rolls of the church at least annually and to counsel with those who have neglected the responsibilities of membership. Accordingly, a committee was appointed to conduct such a review and determine if members should be considered active or placed on the inactive roll. Active members are those who participate in the work and worship of the church and support the work of the church through the giving of money, time, and talents. They are entitled to all of the rights and privileges of the church, and may vote and hold office. Inactive members are those who have failed intentionally to participate in the work and worship of the church for a period of one year. They are entitled to rights and privileges of the church, but may not vote or hold office. After several years, if inactive members do not wish to become active, they may be removed from the rolls by the Session. The Session may consider extenuating circumstances such as age and health in determining whether an inactive member should be removed. Members who live too far from RPC to attend worship are encouraged to find a church home closer to them so that they may regularly benefit from the opportunities of spiritual growth and pastoral care.

Finances:

An on-going concern at RPC has been the high number of members who do not pledge their financial support to the church, and those who do not pay the “per capita” assessment. There are almost more non-pledgers than pledgers at RPC, and the Session is concerned about the implications this has for the future of our church. The per capita amount owed to Presbytery, due in January, 2009, is almost \$13,000, based on our membership as reported in last year’s annual report. This money supports the work of the Presbytery, Synod, and General Assembly. Only 17% of RPC members paid this for the year, which may be done by using the special envelope provided to those who pledge or by simply writing a check to RPC. The current amount is \$28.29 per member. If all members paid their per capita assessment by the end of the year, the RPC budget deficit could be reduced to almost zero!

Other Session actions:

- ◆ approved vacation leave for Rev. Jansen from December 25 to December 31;
- ◆ discussed the first draft of the 2009 budget;
- ◆ authorized the Stewardship Committee to allow the sale of alcoholic beverages (beer & wine) at church fund raisers if deemed appropriate;
- ◆ approved naming the outdoor area behind the church and between the manse and social hall as “The Prayer Garden,” which will feature a dogwood tree planted in memory of Liberty Petru Dvorak.

Fellowship Goes Green

One of the goals of the Fellowship Committee for 2008 was to help RPC become “greener” – to lessen our negative impact on the environment and thus be better stewards of the earth God has given to us. Our first step toward this goal was to cut down on the amount of waste that was generated during fellowship events, especially the non-biodegradable styrofoam. We encouraged coffee hour hosts to use the church china and run the dishwasher. We thank all of the hosts who were willing to give this a try, and especially some of our youth who were willing to help run the dishwasher for hosts on any given Sunday.



Unfortunately, part way through the year our water heaters started having problems and became unreliable enough that it was no longer feasible to ask people to run the dishwasher and we went back to using styrofoam, paper, and plastic. The Fellowship Committee would like to thank the trustees for thinking green and keeping an eye on the future. Instead of simply fixing or replacing the existing water heaters, they looked toward the more cutting edge technology of an on-demand water heater. This is not only a more energy efficient water heater for the kitchen, but it allows us to go back to using the dishes and cutting back on the garbage produced during fellowship events like coffee hour and WNL! dinners.

We'll be taking further steps toward our green goals in 2009. We'd like RPC to be better recyclers of those disposable products that we are still using, and we'll be looking into how to best go about that. Interested in helping us further this goal? 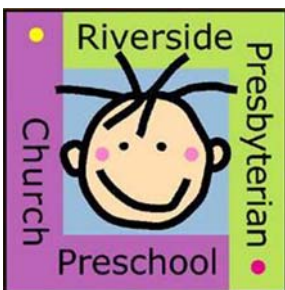



Family Worship **Christmas Eve**

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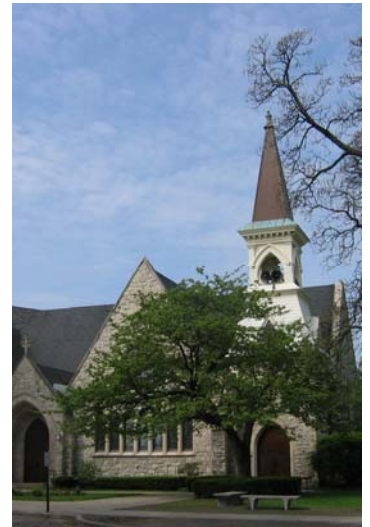
