
The Vision

Contemporary Worship

Easter is a time for spring growth, resurrection and new life. So, it's a good time to talk about "contemporary worship." The phrase "contemporary worship" can be interpreted in many ways. If one considers only the music, the difficulty in coming to a definition is immediately apparent. Using Biblical forms of music as a reference point, *everything* that we do in church, and everything that has been done in church over the past *thousand* years, qualifies as "contemporary worship." The music that has been played most frequently in Christian churches has changed every century since Jesus appreciated the tambourine and the lyre.

On the other hand, there are radio stations today for which "contemporary" means that nothing more than two years old is played. So, the phrase can mean almost whatever you want. To be clear, what I mean by the phrase "contemporary worship" is any form of worship that is deliberately intended to appeal *culturally* to younger persons.





Why are these "contemporary?" They reflect a preference for visual over auditory, for dialogue over monologue, and for questioning over answering. All of these have been identified as statistically preferred by younger people.

To say that there is a difference in preferences among age groups means that not everyone will get one's own preference. Of course, it may feel that something is being *lost* if your preference is no longer the sole form of worship. But consider this. Your feeling of loss may be precisely the same as the feeling of loss that others experience whenever your cultural preference predominates.

Likewise, you have probably noticed that Dr. Sally has been moving the congregation toward some musically "contemporary" worship, such as: bongos, flutes, kids' choirs, as well as some of her snappy anthem selections and bell choir numbers. In conjunction with my efforts regarding the message, we will also seek to continue with more and more of such efforts regarding the music.

Of course, all change in the church happens gradually—that's been true for 2000 years. We will continue to re-evaluate, re-balance the mixture, and make adjustments as seems appropriate. April Worship Schedule

April 5 (Palm Sunday at 10:00 a.m.) Mark 11:1-11 "An Elected King" The Riverside Singers, Chancel Choir, and flutist Robin Jensen will lead our music. Is Jesus the type of king who worries about getting the rented colt back on time so as not to upset anyone? Today there will be children waving palms, and we will introduce the Christ Candle in worship. April 10 (Good Friday at noon) There will be one Ecumenical Worship Service at the United Methodist Church featuring the Seven Last Words of Christ interpreted by seven area preachers. To join the Ecumenical music efforts for the day (instrumental or vocal), please contact <u>Pastor Bromleigh McCleneghan</u> for further instructions.

April 12 (Easter Sunday Worship Services at 9 a.m. and 10:30 a.m.—no Sunday School today.) Mark 16:1-8 "What Will Heaven Be Like?" Solo trumpeter Jessica Musgrave, pianist Mary Ann Sadilek, Chancel Choir, and RPC Handbell choir will provide both traditional music from Handel's Messiah as well as a new work by River Forest resident Joel Raney. We'll talk about resurrection and the ways that Jesus continued to live in the disciples, and the ways that they believed they would continue to live after they had died.

April 19 (Jazz Sunday at 10:00 a.m.) Andy Tecson leads the jazz band for all the music today. John 20:19-31 "Healthy Skepticism" Does God despise our natural human skepticism?

April 26 1 John 3:1-10 "Who Goes to Heaven?" How do we distinguish the children of God from those who are not children of God?

Jazz Sunday – April 19

Riverside native Andy Tecson and company will provide liturgical jazz at the 10:00 a.m. service. Andy's interest in composition first took flight while studying with Ken Jandes at the American Conservatory in Chicago while Andy was in high school. While studying as an exchange student at the University of Munich, Andy Tecson performed on tenor and soprano sax with several bands that toured throughout Germany. Upon returning to Chicago, he was a member of Steve Goodman's band, Howard Levy's band and the Jump in the Saddle Band.



His interest in jazz, composition, and worship soon led him to devote his musical interests solely to composing, arranging, and leading jazz worship services. His other profession, practicing law with Chuhak & Tecson, P.C. in Chicago, helps him to serve boards committed to providing services to families and individuals, including Lutheran Child and Family Services of Illinois and the Cornerstone Foundation of Lutheran Social Services of Illinois. His commitment to contemporary sacred music is also reflected in service on the board of Soli Deo Gloria.

In a Christian Century column, famed theologian Dr. Martin E. Marty has written that "When Tecson and company bring Jazz into the sanctuary, they induce awe."

Trustees News

Status update on projects:

- ◆ The back door off the parking lot has often been found unlocked when the church is not in use. Please follow the posted instructions and contact a trustee with questions. Remember, if you unlock the door for an event, you are also responsible to see that it is locked after everyone has left....
- Please be sure to turn off the oven or stove after use. The oven was recently left on overnight...not only does this waste energy, but is a fire safety hazard.
- Children and teens using the gym are to be supervised by an adult at all times.

Deacon Doings

On Saturday, March 7, the McCormick Theological Seminary in Chicago sponsored the 2009 Leadership, Education and Development (L.E.A.D.) conference for the whole church. A number of RPC members attended, including some of the deacons. Following a worship hour, a series of two-hour workshops were presented during the morning and afternoon, including such topics as *New Deacon Training, Becoming a Multicultural Church in a Multicultural World, Do It Yourself Mission Trip, Dual Citzenship – United States and the Realm of God,* and *Witnessing for Peace with Justice in the Americas*. Many of the topics covered have been useful and served as a basis for follow-up discussion in subsequent meetings.

For example, *Peace and Justice in the Americas* focused primarily on the cultural, political, and military problems in Colombia, South America, as related by Dr. Luis Rivera and a team of pastors and students from McCormick who were recently on mission efforts in that country. The deacons have had an ongoing interest in the human rights problems in Colombia for considerable time, in particular the displacement of indigenous native populations, ending aerial fumigation for coca that often kills needed agricultural crops, and providing aid to strengthen health care, education and nutrition among the displaced. With these goals in mind, the deacons at their March 17 meeting approved the disbursement of \$1,000 towards program E047871 of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), which directly seeks to provide income generation and nutritional support to displaced communities in Colombia. Due to internal violence in Colombia, over 4 million indigenous people, Afro-Colombians, and campesinos (peasant farm workers) have been displaced. The deacons continue to maintain an active concern for the humanitarian problems in Indonesia, Latin America, Africa and Colombia in particular. As such, they support the efforts of the PC(USA) and the United Nations for their work with internal refuges, displaced women, and threatened indigenous communities.

In other business, the deacons voted to allocate \$500 for two students toward the summer Mission Trip to Tennessee to work in the Appalachian community. They also authorized the production of RPC T-shirts for members doing mission / community service work as well as making them available at minimal cost to the congregation. Deacon Lloyd Bradbury developed the design for the shirts. It was also determined that the RPC youth group will provide assistance by giving the service at the British Retirement Home in the month of May.



The Fellowship Hall was transformed by Connie Kelly into a warm and intimate Coffee House venue for our twenty homegrown acts coordinated by John Haugland.




Legion of Extraordinary: Available to Help (LE:AH)

Recent economic events have precipitated the formation of a new ecumenical, nondenominational group for unand under-employed people that meets weekly at Riverside Presbyterian Church. Called the *Legion of Extraordinary: Available to Help* (LE:AH), the group is currently inviting unand under-employed members of the community to come and join their discussions. The group wants to be present and active for people who have involuntarily found themselves in the midst of the current crisis. This "present and active" aspect involves facilitating discussion among members about their current unemployed status. Another important focus of the group is to harness the collective energy of its members to tackle work projects for the benefit of local charitable groups. LE:AH meets weekly on Tuesday from 3:30 pm to 5:00 pm at RPC. All are welcome. Fellowship Committee Reminders

The Fellowship Committee respectfully reminds all groups using the church kitchen of the following procedures:

- Make us aware of any supplies you will be needing that you are not purchasing yourself, and let us know if things are running low after you are finished. Contact <u>Lisa Aulerich-Marciniak</u> about supplies.
- Do not leave food unless it is something that can be used for coffee fellowship or WNL!, or if you have specific plans for its use in the near future, and then please label it appropriately. Anything not labeled will be considered fair game for serving by any groups using the kitchen.
- Read and follow the posted directions for the dishwasher if you are using it for your event. (Note: the dishwasher does not work well with the sinks running simultaneously.)
- Put all church dishes, utensils, and staples back where you found them, and take home anything you brought with you. It is also helpful if someone from your group takes home any towels, etc, that need to be laundered, and returns them as soon as possible.
- Before you leave, make sure ovens are off, dishwasher wall switch is off, coffee makers are unplugged, etc.
- Take all garbage out to the dumpster.
- Check the back door before you leave. Lock the door from the OUTSIDE if it is unlocked at the end of your event.

Camp Saugatuck to be Sold

Representatives from the Lakeshore Camping Consortium made a presentation to the Human Scene class on March 22, related to the Presbytery of Chicago's plans to sell Camp Saugatuck. The Presbytery of Chicago was forced to borrow money to settle a lawsuit, and the only assets owned by the Presbytery that could settle this debt are the Presbytery's headquarters, reportedly valued at \$4.1 million, and Presbyterian Camps at Saugatuck. The Presbytery has had the camp appraised (at up to \$14 million for residential development), with the very real possibility of selling the camp for residential development. It is not known whether there is a developer/buyer presently interested in this 130-acre property.

The Lakeshore Camping Consortium (LCC) is a 501(c)(3) corporation, whose Board of Directors are members of constituent congregations in the Chicago Presbytery. The LCC has presented an offer of \$7 million to purchase the Presbyterian Camps in order to maintain and preserve the ministry of the Camp, which has operated as a church camp since 1899. According to LCC, they have a commitment for financing that would include funds for the purchase, as well as for capital improvements to the camp facilities, thereby allowing for year-round use of the camp by Presbytery members, other churches, scout groups, etc. Income from year-round use would, under the LCC plan, provide sufficient funds for debt service. Should the LCC, at some time in the future, determine that continued operation of the camp is no longer economically feasible, the proceeds from the sale of the camp would revert to the Presbytery of Chicago.

There is no question that the Camp will be sold. The issue is whether it will be sold at a lower price to maintain its ministry as a camp, or whether it will be sold for a higher price for development. 
Youth Sunday






Presbyterian Women's Coordinating Team Meeting



Book Review: Sophie Scholl and the White Rose by Annette Dumbach and Jud Newborn

The time was 1942. The place was Munich, Germany. And the heroine was a young girl, a university student, who, with her brother and other friends, dared to challenge the Third Reich, one of the most oppressive regimes in history. The White Rose group Sophie Scholl and her fellow students formed was born out of a deep Christian faith that would not permit them to stand on the sidelines and do nothing. "We will not be silent! We are your bad conscience!" their pamphlets exhorted as they attempted to prod students and professors into active resistance. And months before news about the death camps reached the outside world, these deeply religious young people dared to tell their fellow Germans what "resettlement in the East" really meant.

Who was General E.N Bates?

According to the RPC Church History booklet, General E.N Bates, elected an elder in 1886, was a member of Abraham Lincoln's cabinet, serving as Attorney General. This could not have been possible, as Attorney General Bates died in Missouri in 1869! Then who was *our* General Bates? The following obituary from the *Chicago Tribune* of May 30, 1898, highlights some of the accomplishments of this distinguished gentleman who served RPC for a brief time.

GENERAL E.N. BATES IS DEAD

STATE SENATOR IN MINNESOTA AND FORMER
TREASURER OF ILLINOIS DIES AT
MINNEAPOLIS

Minneapolis, Minn., May 29, 1898 — General Erastus Newton Bates died in this city this evening, aged 70 years. Deceased was an early resident of Minneapolis, though for many years since residing in Illinois. The remains will be taken to Springfield, Ill. for burial.

Erastus Newton Bates was born at Plainfield, Mass., in 1828. While still a young man he removed to Ohio, whence he came to Minneapolis in 1855. He was connected with many of the initial industries of the city, was one of the founders of Plymouth Church, one

of framers of the State constitution, and one of the first State Senators under that constitution. He removed to Illinois before the war, and there enlisted in the Eightieth Illinois Volunteers. In the war he rose to Brigadier General. His entire command was captured and he became prisoner at Andersonville and Libby. At Libby he was one of the promoters of the tunnel by which many of the prisoners escaped, but he was too ill to escape himself. He was afterwards exchanged.

Returning to Illinois he was twice elected State Treasurer, and later declined the nomination for Governor on the Democratic ticket on account of poor health. He was married twice, and his second wife died last August. His home was at Riverside, Ill. He leaves two sons, both of whom reside in Illinois.
