# The Vision

November 2009

## **Thank You RPC**

It is the month for giving thanks. The early pilgrims were thankful that their harvest gave them hope to survive the winter, and that their neighbors (the natives) were helpful and supportive. Compared with them, we have less chance of starvation or frostbite this winter, and our neighbors are even friendlier. Thus, we certainly exceed the pilgrims in reasons for being thankful.

The pilgrims focused their thanks towards God. Giving thanks to God is one of the earliest practices of our religion, going back at least as far as Abraham and Sarah. But, it may not always feel natural for you to take some time, stop what you're doing, and give thanks to God. This is often because we are no longer so certain of where and how God is active.

In the Bible you'll find songs of thanksgiving (e.g., Exodus 15) that celebrate how God vanquished a foe. Or sometimes you will see a modern professional athlete giving thanks to God for vanquishing a foe. Sensitive Christians have questioned whether it is always appropriate to thank God, because "God works in mysterious ways." So how do we know exactly when we should be thanking God?

I think it is better to give thanks to God that is sometimes based on a wrong assumption, than to refrain from thanking God entirely. It is possible to misjudge anyone, including God. You may think your best friend is really caring, only to discover she had ulterior motives. Thanking God is the beginning of a relationship with God—it means that we recognize that God is active in our lives. If God is not active in our lives, then we have no relationship. So, sure, it involves faith rather than certainty, but we all need to make an effort to find where God is active in ways that touch us.

I am thankful for this church, for the spirit of cooperation that helps us to find compromises, for the spirit of volunteerism that allows us to move forward, for the spirit of stewardship that allows us to make use of God's talents among us, for the spirit of curiosity that leads us to explore new ideas, and for the spirit of love that binds us together in joyful fellowship. Is this what God's Spirit is doing among us? I think so.

Allow me to be even more specific. I am thankful for Lynda Nadkarni's years of ministry among us, for the love that she put into her work, and for the servant's heart that she has in being willing to continue to help the church in other ways. I am thankful for Jim Sit and Jon Jansky, along with all the trustees, for the many ways that they keep the church going smoothly without anyone knowing what they are doing. I am thankful for the elders who take initiative and execute their duties as servant leaders who receive very little recognition. I am thankful for the deacons who care for others, share in their burdens, and bring light into dark places. I am thankful for the staff here—including Fred and Cindy and those who have accepted larger responsibilities without pay. It has not always been obvious how we were going to fill a staff position, but it has certainly turned out well! We have the best staff we could hope for. Each of them goes beyond the limits of the job to excel in their areas of ministry. I am thankful that the Spirit moves people to continue coming to worship, to sing with gusto, to pray sincerely, to listen carefully to God's Word, and to put what is learned in worship into practice beyond the church.

Does all of this happen by mere coincidence? I suppose that is possible, but by faith, I believe it is God's Spirit who is blessing this church in these and many other ways.

#### **November 29** Luke 21:25-36 *Guard Your Hearts*

As we begin the season of Advent, we remember the sense of urgency and anticipation that surrounded the time preceding Jesus' birth. In our similarly uncertain world, how can we keep our hearts attuned to the promise of hope in Jesus' ministry?

#### **Session News**

- approved plans for the fall Stewardship Drive, which will culminate on Commitment Sunday, November 8, with an every-member canvass.
- tabled until Spring a request from the trustees to approve replacing broken sidewalk sections near the Manse.
- discussed a request from Freedom House Ministry to lease space at RPC on Saturdays and deferred a decision pending receipt of additional information.

# **CROP** (Communities Responding to Overcome Poverty) Walk



On October 18, RPC members joined their neighbors to raise awareness and funding for international relief and development, as well as local hunger-fighting agencies. 2,000 communities across the country take part in the CROP walk each year.

Hungry people in developing countries typically walk as much as six miles a day to get food, water, and fuel, and to take their goods to market. In the last 20 years, CROP walks have raised over \$264 million.

How much money did the RPC walkers raise this year? \$1,454— with a huge chunk of that by the RPC youth group and choir members! *Thank You* to those who walked and to those who supported the walkers with their pledges. As a result of your efforts, we raised \$364 for the west suburban sheltering organization, BEDS PLUS, and \$1,090 for Church World Service.
