February is the month of love. A few months ago I attended a marriage enrichment seminar taught by elder Melinda Yachnin (who is a professional marriage-enricher).

Of course, marriages live or die based on the quality of communication. But Melinda introduced us to the many methods couples have for conveying simple thoughts such as "I love you" or "thank you." The methods included using words, or writing words, as you might expect, but it also included actions like buying gifts, or doing favors. I learned that women are generally drawn to the use of words, while men are more likely to communicate by doing favors.

And this is very true of me. When I feel a fondness or a thankfulness, my usual response is to work on something I believe would be helpful to such persons. I may incorporate their struggles into a sermon, or a class outline, or I may work to shield them from harm, or I may put in extra time trying to streamline events that surround their ministries so their events run more smoothly. This is the same way I behave within my own family. I very rarely use plain old words to convey my thoughts. I'm more likely to work to try to make someone's life better than to write out a thank you card.

It was a joy for me to hear that a great many men act exactly as I do—that I am "normal" in this regard. But it was also a challenge to be confronted with just how different the typical woman is (as well as a minority of men). Some people would really rather you use words than that you do them a favor. I'd prefer a favor over a "thank you," but lots of people do not share that preference.

If I connect Melinda's lesson about love with the Christian message of the Body of Christ, then two challenges become apparent. As Paul said, we are all one body, some are eyes, some are ears, some are noses, etc. One person's gifts and strengths are another person's weaknesses. My strength is in being a hard-worker, and in perceiving what others around me may need to make their lives easier. My weakness is in using words to convey affection or thankfulness.

But, since everyone is not like me, I can't just "do unto others what I would want them to do unto me." Rather, I have to push myself to do what does not come naturally. I have to force myself to write thank you cards, and say things like "thank you" or "good job," etc. That is my challenge.

But since we are one Body, you also have a challenge. Knowing that your pastor has some gifts and some weaknesses, you should try to compensate for my weaknesses by being extra diligent in using your gifts of saying verbal affirmations. Other members of the Church may really need to hear from you, and I may be inadequate to the task.

If we all work together to love God and love our neighbor using whatever gifts of love God has given us, we will always be a blessed church.

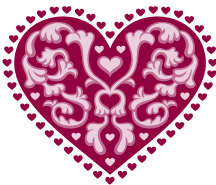

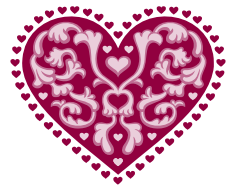
February 21 Guest Preacher Reverend Dan McNerney from Presbyterian Frontier Fellowship will speak about his mission work in Egypt and in many other countries.

Session News

In January, the Session:

- ◆ authorized the celebration of the Lord's Supper on the first Sunday of each month, as well as on Ash Wednesday and Maundy Thursday;
- ◆ approved the serving of Communion by intinction on April 1 (Maundy Thursday), July 4, and August 1;
- ◆ re-elected Fred Kitch as RPC Treasurer and Mary Ann Sadilek as Clerk of Session;
- ◆ changed the time of the late Christmas Eve worship service from 11:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m.;
- ◆ authorized the purchase of additional electric candles for the 4:00 p.m. Christmas Eve family worship service;
- ◆ decided to request a suggested donation of \$10 for those who attend the Messiah concert in order to defray expenses of this annual event;
- ◆ noted that there are two vacancies on the Board of Trustees and encouraged suggestions for nominees for those positions;
- ◆ approved a new policy concerning allocation of *unrestricted* gifts to RPC through wills and bequests: 60% will go into the Endowment Fund and 40% will be placed in a new fund, "Special Uses" to be used at the discretion of the Session. "Special Uses" could include such things as capital expenditures or reducing a budget deficit at year end;
- ◆ received further information regarding the proposed sale of the Saugatuck Camp properties, which may be brought before Presbytery at the February meeting;
- ◆ noted with gratitude that 145 pledges have been received to date, including 26 new pledgers.

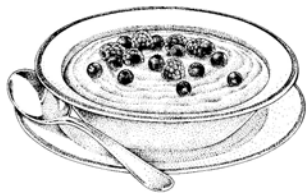

Pledge Drive

Thanks for stepping up! The results are in and we are very thankful to all who were able to make a financial pledge for 2010 to support the worship, programs, and fellowship at Riverside Presbyterian Church. We know that these have been very difficult economic times for many of our members and so we doubly appreciate the sacrifices you make to support our church.

Pledges for the 2010 Drive totaled \$285,420. While this was slightly less in total than last year, we are thrilled with the story that the numbers tell:

- 26 NEW pledgers, representing 18% of the total
- 32% of our pledgers INCREASED their pledges in 2010
- 37% of our pledgers MAINTAINED the same pledge
- 14% DECREASED their pledges

The average pledge was \$1,950 annually

Session members, Deacons and Trustees did a magnificent job in assisting with our every member visitation; we are so grateful to you and know that we wouldn't have been as successful without your help.

Thank you again to all. Pledging is a year-round issue, so we will be reporting from time to time on the status of our finances.

Need a New Year's Resolution?

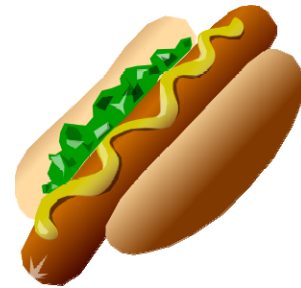

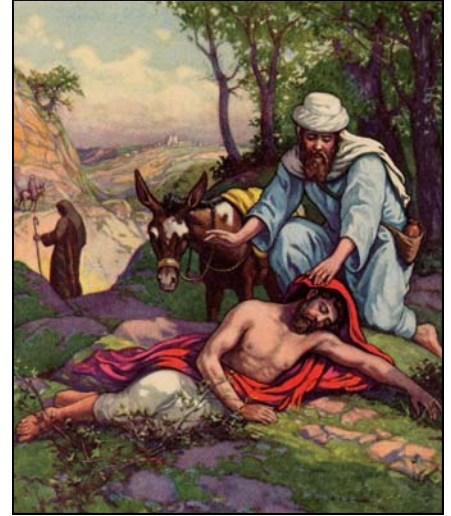

Bible Study

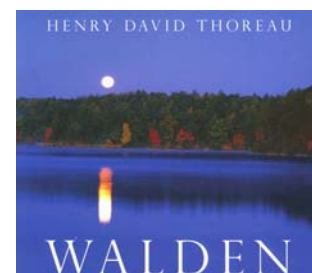

**Did you know. . .* that George Washington was born on February 11, 1731, at a time when England (and its colonies) used the Julian calendar? In 1752, Britain changed to the newer Gregorian calendar, by skipping 11 days. George Washington updated his own birthday from the old date of February 11 to the Gregorian date of February 22. The majority of early Americans held on to the birthdays they'd always used. The calendar switch of 1752 included another significant change. Under the Julian system, the year began on March 25. A colonist who went to bed on March 24, 1700, woke up on March 25, 1701. The new Gregorian rules set the start of the year to January 1. This created some confusion, since anyone who was born between January 1 and March 25 in the old system would have the wrong birth year in the new one. George Washington's old-style birthday was, in fact, February 11, 1731. Genealogists and some record-keepers of the time used a system called "double dating" for cases like these: Washington's date of birth might have been recorded as 1731/1732. (Today we consider him to have been born in 1732.)
