The Vision

September 2010

Christian Unity

I am so excited about September 19. In conjunction with the 25th anniversary of the Covenant of Churches, we will be proclaiming Christian unity in a way that, to my knowledge, has never been done before. We're calling it "A Taste of Churches" (and, yes, there will be food involved).

The Covenant of Churches consists of representatives from each of the six churches in Riverside plus both of the churches in North Riverside. The board meets around five times a year. Earlier this year, the board proposed a "Hospitality Sunday," whereby the leaders of each church would remain to preside over a "normal" worship service, while the rest of the parishioners would be strongly encouraged to visit another Covenant church. This proposal was taken to the leadership of each of the eight churches, and they all agreed. Every church member in Riverside or North Riverside (other than worship/fellowship leaders), of every denomination, has been encouraged to visit a different church on September 19.

Wow. One day in twenty-five years—what's so "exciting" about that? Some will be most excited by the different types of food that will be served in the fellowship hours, but I am mostly excited about the message behind the event. What does it mean that all of these eight churches have agreed to this "pew exchange?"

Well, let me begin with what it does NOT mean. We are not asking people to go beyond their comfort zones. If you are not comfortable saying certain words, or receiving Communion in a certain fashion, then just don't participate in those parts. If you are only physically capable of walking to the church that is closest to you, don't go broke hiring a taxi. Nor should anyone alter one's pledge to one's home church because of this. One-time visitors rarely give financial donations—though such donations are always welcome. This is also not an effort for mass conversions.

Rather, this is an exercise in education and affirmation. Visit a church to learn more about it. Put your preconceptions to the test. And poke around. Perhaps you will find a good idea that can be adapted to your own church. In biology, they call this "cross-pollination," though Christians use the word "cross" in a different way.

It is also an affirmation of one another. We say to our sister churches that they are fellow children within God's family, even though they do things differently. It is good to have so many people affirm you as a fellow worker in Christ.

Lastly, this is a message to those who do not attend any church. The media has often portrayed Christians as exclusivist, esoteric, closed-minded and judgmental. This event counters that popular image. It also provides an opportunity for those who are on the edge, who have long considered visiting a church, but have been too shy to give it a try. You can tell such persons, "go on September 19—nearly everyone there will be a confused visitor just like you."

And if you stay at RPC on that day, please try to help the visitors to find their way. Obviously, some folks will need to attend their home churches in order to present a "normal" worship experience—as nearly as possible.


September Worship Schedule

September 5 *Luke 14:25-33* "You Have to Earn It" Just like with any other relationship, the value of your relationship with God will depend on how much effort you are willing to invest in it. If you receive something (cheap grace) without any effort, you will instinctively not value that. We will celebrate Communion today, possibly by intinction.

September 12 *Luke 15:1-10* "Who Is Going to Sunday School?" Every church has its faithful members who are committed to God. But on kickoff Sunday, there are always lots of people who haven't been to church in awhile. How do the teachers feel about such students? How does God feel? Today is Sunday School Kickoff day. Jenny will call up all the Sunday School leaders for a commissioning prayer.

September 19 *Luke 16:1-13* "God and/or Wealth" How does Jesus expect us to show that we are truly committed to God? Past generations of Jews struggled by serving other gods, but more modern monotheists have a different struggle in the area of faithfulness. Today we will celebrate the 25th Anniversary of the Covenant of Churches by encouraging folks who are not helping with anything in Church this day to go and visit another Covenant Church.

September 26 *Luke 16:19-31* "Convincing Arguments" What kinds of arguments actually change peoples' minds? Are we more swayed by logic that is clear and irrefutable, or more swayed by love that is giving and caring? What does this passage suggest for Christian evangelism? Do we argue people into a new way of life, or love them and let God do the rest? What sort of mission work should we pursue?

Session News

At the August meeting, the Session:

- approved the baptism on August 22 of Nuala Macree Lubeck, daughter of Marty and Debbie Kane Lubeck;
- noted with sadness the deaths of Janet Benson Ashby, Tom Cokins, Carl Martin, and Rudolph Slapansky;
- learned that the proposed sale of Presbytery's Saugatuck camp properties to the Lakeshore Camping Consortium did not close due to lack of adequate financing. LCC hopes to secure pledges for additional funds and begin negotiations again;
- noted that the YTD budget deficit has grown to about \$38,000, due mainly to a shortage of expected income, not an increase in budgeted expenditures;
- approved a suggestion that instructions for liturgists, coffee hour hosts, communion servers, etc. be sent via email to reduce postage expense;
- reviewed and discussed procedures and curriculum for the confirmation class. The session voted that all mentors should be adult members of RPC; any exception would need Session approval. All elders expressed their willingness to serve as mentors if asked. Additional suggestions to the process were made to help confirmands better understand the meaning of membership and the basic tenets of our faith;
- discussed two upcoming fundraisers to address the deficit: a garage sale on September 18 and a spaghetti dinner on October 3;
- encouraged participation in the Covenant of Churches "congregation exchange" on September 19, where members will be invited to worship in a church other than their own;
- noted that Wednesday Night Live! is being reviewed and may re-appear in a different format this year; and
- noted volunteers are being sought to teach basic computer skills to adults in RPC's new computer lab

Proposed Amendments to RPC Bylaws

The Session has called a congregational meeting for Sunday, September 12, 2010, following morning worship, to consider the following amendments to the RPC Bylaws:

To insert a new article:

ARTICLE V - YOUTH OFFICERS

- 1. Confirmed members under the age of 25 may be elected to serve as youth deacons, elders, and trustees.
- 2. Terms for such youth officers shall be determined on a case-by-case basis, considering the availability of qualified individuals and the needs of the church.
- 3. No board shall contain more than three youth officers at any one time.

Explanation: Provides for the election of youth officers, when available and qualified, and allows for flexibility in their terms. Meaningful participation by our youth is important to the growth and health of RPC and will be strengthened by this amendment.

To re-number the remaining Articles as follows:

Current Article V – JOINT MEETING OF THE ELDERS AND DEACONS, will become Article VI

Current Article VI – FINANCES, will become Article VII

Current Article VII – USE OF CHURCH PROPERTIES, will become Article VIII

Current Article VIII –RULES OF ORDER, will become Article IX

Current Article IX -AMENDMENTS, will become Article X

Stewardship: A Way of Life and a Witness to the World

A Spiritual Exercise

Although frequently misunderstood as a matter of church administration and finance, stewardship is an act of spiritual exercise and formation. Sometimes stewardship is regarded primarily from the church's need to receive gifts of time, talent, and treasure to sustain its programs and facilities. Sometimes stewardship is relegated to a limited season, as if there were other seasons in which the fullness and riches of life did not come from God and merit a joyous response. Properly understood, stewardship is a year-round, all-season, spiritual endeavor primarily concerned with our need to give in joyous gratitude to God's gifts and in faithful response to Christ's call.

Scripture affirms that our giving is an issue of spiritual development and maturity: "For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also" (Matt. 6:21). Our hearts follow our investment of money, time, and energy. We may support a variety of charities, but our passion and commitment are with those in which we are invested as donors and volunteers. The newspaper's business section is of most concern to those who are invested in the market. Members who are invested with time, talent, and treasure in the mission and ministry of Christ's church find their hearts drawn into deeper commitment and maturity of faith and practice.


A Sunday School Computer Lab

After a series of fundraisers this spring (Youth Cafe, Barbeque, and Car Wash) and fulfilling the required attendance at youth group events and service hours, our group of teens boarded a flight at Midway Airport on Saturday, July 17 and flew to Long Island, New York, accompanied by Lisa Marciniak, Fred Mitchell, George Dluhy and Youth Advisor Tara Gregus. The group spent the week at the ranch painting fences and chicken coops, weeding flower gardens, working in the Ranch's resale store (*Barbara's Barn*), and interacting with the resident boys and staff in games and during evening devotions. The founders of the ranch, Fern and Jerry Hill, opened their hearts and their home to us from the moment we arrived. They told us that everyone needs 7 hugs a day and gave out as many as they could. Fern and Jerry are the parents of Timothy Hill, the namesake of the Ranch. All of the girls stayed in the "guest house," which was actually Fern and Jerry's home. The boys' accommodations were not as deluxe--they slept in the basement of the administration building—but they didn't complain about it (too much)!

Our church should be very proud of our teens. They immediately started to make connections with the residents and by week's end, we were told by the staff that we had really made an impact and they very much wanted us to return in future years. In fact, we got so much accomplished that they ran out of work for us to do and so they arranged a trip to the beach with the boys and our group on our last day, which they said they had NEVER done before. They felt comfortable doing it with our group since we got along so well with the boys and had worked so hard and behaved so well all week. We also got to spend one day sightseeing in Manhattan. Led by Tara, we traversed the streets of New York City and covered an amazing amount of ground in one day! All in all, it was a very memorable trip and a wonderful group of teens and adults who shared an unforgettable week. We hope everyone who is eligible will consider joining us for **next year's mission trip!**


Bake-Off on September 26
