What Is a Columbarium?

I think it would be fantastic to have a church Columbarium—a storage facility for the permanent interment of ashes (human cremains). Such a storage facility would be constructed on the premises, probably indoors.

For many, the initial reaction to hearing about a Columbarium is negative and fairly emotional. Death carries a kind of taboo. We want to pretend that we will live forever. Few people make detailed plans in advance of their own deaths. In general, death is considered “bad.”

To be physically in the vicinity of something considered “bad” is likely to evoke a negative emotional response. I acknowledge that natural emotional reaction, but then I ask you to move beyond it.

Let us consider the situation calmly and rationally. Churches have been built on premises that included cemeteries for the majority of the past two thousand years. Being buried at a church was an excellent symbol of how we place our hope for life after death into God’s hands. It was also a constant reminder of the “communion of the saints,” of the work done by those who went before us, of the legacy they passed down to us. Finally, it gave families far more “ownership” in a given church, when going to church could include a visit to a grave site.

Over the past two centuries, driven by a lack of available land in areas of population explosion, many church structures were built without attached cemeteries. Along with that new trend, came a decline in the *loyalty* usually afforded one’s church, and an increase in the sentiment that “I’ll remain a member as long as my church continues to suit my fancy.” The struggle to reconcile has more urgency when “my grandparents are buried there.”

Thus, in recent times, many churches are installing columbaria on church grounds, partly from a concern for the financial health of their parishioners. A typical ground burial today costs around \$15,000, while a typical columbarium interment costs around \$2,000. For some, the costs are simply insurmountable, so urns sometimes sit in dark closets for extended periods, and are often disposed of unceremoniously (and illegally).

Environmentalists favor columbaria because the growth of human population has consumed the available land needed to continue former practices. On average, we can bury two hundred cremains in the same area required for one ground burial. Would you prefer that scarce land be dedicated to cemeteries, or to parks?

I am very excited about this opportunity to reclaim the traditional connection of the church with one’s final resting place. I hope you will also become excited as more information comes forward.

- ◆ noted the YTD deficit was \$28,000;
- ◆ approved a policy that groups engaging in fundraising make a good faith effort to return to the general budget an amount sufficient to cover office expenses and postage involved in holding their event;
- ◆ learned of plans for a new RPC Weekend Connections series of multi-generational programs of education, children’s programs and fellowship.

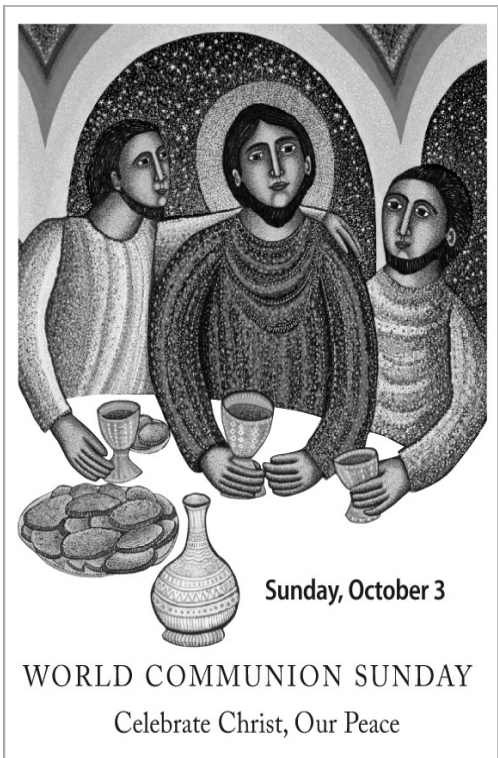

2010 Peacemaking Offering



Every time our congregation receives the Lord's Supper, there is opportunity to remember other Christians around the world who are also receiving these gifts of God. But we make a special point of remembering our unity with Christians worldwide on World Communion Sunday, the first Sunday in October. It is a day to be mindful of the love of Christ, who draws us all together despite our many differences.

As Presbyterians, we recognize that Christ taught us to be peacemakers, and that being peacemakers is part of being Christ's followers. So on World Communion Sunday, we receive the bread and cup of heaven, and we bring our gifts of self, service, and money to be put to work for Christ's peace in the world.

This year is the thirtieth anniversary of the Presbyterian Peacemaking Program and the Peacemaking Offering. The Offering was set up in a way to encourage all levels of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) to work for peace. Each congregation is invited to find ways to promote peace within the congregation and within the community. For that reason, our church will retain 25 percent of the Offering we receive, and the Deacons have decided how best to put this money to work...through a donation to Austin Polytech. Austin Polytech is an Academy High School just 20 minutes from RPC serving 500 students from the Austin community of Chicago. Most of the families of these students have incomes below the federal poverty level. Austin Polytech has a relationship with over 65

manufacturer "Partners." RPC's Bill Vogel serves as the school's Industrial Coordinator, creating job shadowing, summer jobs, and internships for the students. You'll even find him in the Machine Shop teaching "Drill Press" once in a while. He is proud that President Obama said, "Austin Polytech is bringing hope back to the community." Another 25 percent goes to our presbytery or synod, and the remaining 50 percent goes to the General Assembly for peacemaking involvement throughout the world.

Join us on October 3 as our church celebrates World Communion Sunday and as we commit to being instruments of the peace we find in Christ. Come ready to give generously to the Peacemaking Offering.

A Witness to the World

Stewardship is an act of Christian witness. We have heard, “. . . for God loves a cheerful giver” (2 Cor. 9:7). But have we asked why? Do we imagine that God, who is creator of the earth and all within it, needs our gifts? Do we suppose God’s delight is in the gift itself? No. Scripture tells us it is the faithful witness and testimony of the giver that is the source of God’s delight: “And God is able to provide you with every blessing in abundance, so that by always having enough of everything, you may share abundantly in every good work” (2 Cor. 9:8). A believer can be a cheerful giver today, having experienced God’s faithfulness and generosity in days past and trusting in God for the days ahead. Our gifts bear witness that we are sufficiently confident in God’s promises for the future that we may freely, generously, and cheerfully give today.

The cheerful giver also participates in and shares abundantly in every good work that is the mission and ministry of Christ in the world. Cheerful and generous giving bears witness to the world that Christians through the church are continuing Christ’s ministries of hope, help, and healing. The Westminster Confession of Faith affirms, “All believers are, therefore, under obligation to sustain the ordinances of the Christian religion where they are already established, and to contribute by their prayers, gifts, and personal efforts to the extension of the Kingdom of Christ throughout the whole earth” (*Book of Confessions*, 6.058). God’s delight in the cheerful giver comes through the witness borne, the ministry maintained, the mission furthered, and the lives touched.

RPC Weekend Connections ▪ October 15

How do we balance it all—the busy schedules with the desire to get together with other folks for an enjoyable and meaningful evening out once in awhile? We have the answer: *Weekend Connections* is a new endeavor for RPC this year, a chance to gather once a month at the church for a variety of programs, open to church members and anyone in the community who would like to attend. Programs planned for the year ahead include films, a square dance, book discussions, a hike and Open Mic Night.

RPC *Weekend Connections*' first event, on Saturday, October 15, is a showing of the documentary, [*The Power of Forgiveness*](#) with discussion to follow. The film includes events such as 9/11, the Amish whose school was attacked, peace efforts with children in Northern Ireland, and interviews with Elie Wiesel, religious leaders, writers and scientists who study physiologic and psychological effects of forgiveness in people. It explores forgiveness in various faiths and how the scientific community is now measuring the benefits of letting go of grief and resentment. Viewing and discussion will begin in the Social Hall, at 6:30 pm. Beverages will be provided (bring a dessert to share if you wish). Child care will be provided (\$5/child/night) but advance notice of need for childcare is necessary, to allow for arrangement for sitters.

CROP Walk ▪ October 17

The CROP Walk is a program of Church World Service, supported by the Riverside/North Riverside Covenant of Churches, to raise funds to combat world hunger. Registration for the 5-mile walk will be held at 1:30 p.m. on October 17 at Riverside Presbyterian Church. (There will be a "Golden Mile" walk for those who prefer one mile to the five-mile route.) The walkers will check in and turn in their pledge envelopes and monetary donations, receive a map of the route, a bottle of water, CROP Walk stickers or badges, and a community gift from the Riverside Bank. 

Womack Scholarship Dinner ▪ October 23

On May 5, 1990, Ryan Womack and his Little League teammates were enjoying the first day of the season. The seven and eight-year-olds were in Harrington Park, getting ready for the game, when a Cadillac hurtled off an adjacent street, jumped the curb, and slammed into the children. Three, including Ryan Womack, died. Six other children and three adults were injured. To honor the memory of their son, Randy and Lonnie Womack created the Ryan Womack Scholarship Fund. Since its inception, 152 recipients have received scholarships totaling \$492,000. One of the sources of endowment funds for this scholarship is the annual Womack Scholarship dinner/dance, which is usually held on the Saturday before Ryan's birthday. This year the event will be held on **October 23** at the Riverside Golf Club. Tickets for the dinner are \$100 per person (a portion tax-deductible).
