Razing Hell



Recently, you gifted me with a continuing education week for reading. And now I'm going to do something I have not yet done in twenty plus years of ministry—recommend a book to the entire church.

You may wonder why I have never done that before. The answer is, I have never been so impressed with a book that I felt was written for a lay audience. Not even my own book qualifies for this honor (because it is not written for a lay audience). Also, I harbor a guilty conscience for having a very large stack of books that have been recommended to me (which I have not had time to

read) and am hesitant to add to anyone else's guilt stack.

Razing Hell: Rethinking Everything You've Been Taught About God's Wrath and Judgment was written by Sharon Baker and published by Westminster John Knox Press in August, 2010. I believe that the subject matter of this book touches the lives of every adult (confirmed) member of this church. I recommend it for Men's Forum, Women's Forum, Companions in Christ, small group Bible studies, confirmation class extra credit reading, or any other educational group in the church. I hope that many of you will read it. You can buy it from all the usual outlets or check out the copy from the church library or from the public library.

What is the book about, you ask? Well, the title is pretty straightforward (as is the author's writing style). The understanding of God's judgment is a keystone in understanding our own salvation and how we should view people with whom we disagree. But it is also critical, as she explains, in laying a foundation for how we behave toward others. We are created in the image of God and encouraged to follow in God's ways. So, it is natural for us to act towards others in the way that we believe God acts towards others. But what if our beliefs are misguided?

Ms. Baker does not "raze" the traditional notion of Hell by eliminating it and declaring that all persons are treated equally by God, regardless of their lives. However, she does offer a substitute notion of "Hell" that retains divine Judgment, but eliminates any hint of a God who acts out of wrath. She portrays a God who seeks redemption and reconciliation, not retribution.

If you have ever been wronged, if you have ever felt that someone has "sinned against you," then this book will help you consider your options in light of God's ways. Or, if you have evangelized someone who seemed turned off by a God who was portrayed as vengeful or vindictive, then this book will give you some alternative answers.

To give you just a taste, consider the question—Can a God of justice sentence a sinner to an eternal/infinite punishment for a finite/temporal sin? I agree with Ms. Baker that the answer is No. But where does that leave us?

Currently we have an all-church book discussion scheduled for January 22, 2010—details to be announced.


Scouts
