Presbyterian Lent

Ash Wednesday is on March 9 this year, and after that we have forty days of Lent. Some traditional Presbyterians may wonder about this, since John Calvin didn't believe in observing Lent. To Calvin, Lent was just a human invention and every day should be the same as every other day.

Of course, Calvin was right about Lent being a human invention. The same was true for Palm Sunday, Easter and Christmas. Jesus did not command any of these dates to be kept as annual festival dates. The original apostles did not observe these dates. It was later Christians who decided that we needed to celebrate these events, so they created some traditions to do so.

Calvin wanted us to copy, as nearly as possible, the original apostles. He wanted to throw out all of the human "invention" that had occurred after Jesus (otherwise known as Church Tradition). This resulted in the Reformation slogan "sola scriptura."

In my opinion, this was too extreme. God's Spirit continued to guide faithful Christians long after Jesus died (just as Jesus had promised). Those faithful Christians "invented" new traditions, as they felt inspired by that Spirit. Some were good and some were not so good, but to throw out everything on principle was too simplistic.

Calvin also believed very strongly in humility—humility based on the realization that we are all sinners. He did not want any church to bear his name because of his humility. This is the teaching from Calvin that Presbyterians have taken most dearly to heart.

Because of our humility, we have realized that even Calvin made mistakes. The indiscriminate discarding of Tradition was sometimes an insult to the Spirit.

This all comes together in the season of Lent. Presbyterians now celebrate Lent, in a reversal of our former practice. Why? We were able to recognize our own error, and we also recognized that Lent is a good tradition. It helps us to remember our own sinful nature and to embrace humility. The habit of doing anything we can in order to "not be Catholic" is not a humble position to take.

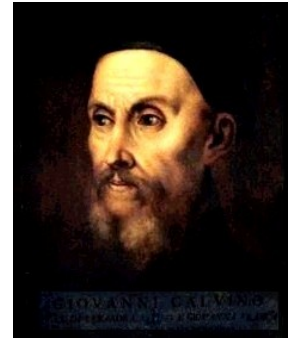
So, we celebrate Ash Wednesday with ashes, oil, candles and lots of traditions invented by the Catholics (as inspired by God's Spirit). The truly humble Presbyterian can say "thanks for your help" rather than saying "I don't need anyone else."

Lent also serves as a partial corrective to our general tendency to be too intellectual. Presbyterians, perhaps more than any others, emphasize preaching. Other Christians have much more physical/sensory connection with God. Lent is a time to do some fasting (experience some hunger), light some candles, smear some ashes, put your knees on the floor, and generally get "in touch" with God in a different way.

Of course we want to use our intellects to examine our lives and identify our sins. But confession can seem somewhat hollow if we do not feel an emotional bond with the Lord to whom we confess. And emotional bonds are built on more than just one's intellect.

So, as Presbyterians who endorse Calvin's slogan "Church Reformed and Always Reforming," let us celebrate a holy and humble Lent.

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Worship/Church News

March Worship Schedule

March 6 *Matthew 17:1-9* “Wicky Wacky Sunday” The main message of the day will be given via a skit performed by the kids. We will also have Communion.

March 9 Ash Wednesday Family Worship 7:00 p.m. Readings will come from *Psalms 51:1-17* and *Matthew 6:1-6*. This will be an intimate family-type service geared toward helping people understand Ash Wednesday and prepare for Lent. The service will include an interactive Bible Study (no sermon), the imposition of ashes, and communion by intinction.

March 13 *Genesis 2:15-17, 3:1-7* “Naked Before God” Why did Adam and Eve suddenly realize they were naked? What is the relationship between wisdom and responsibility? Is it true that “ignorance is bliss?”

March 20 *Romans 4:1-5, 13-17* “Confirmation Sunday” Today’s “sermon” will focus on what issues of faith are most pressing for our confirmation class of 2011. The scripture lesson is about Abraham receiving grace through faith (as opposed to works). They will also be received as new members during worship.

March 27 *John 4:5-42* “Savior of the World” Why did Jesus ignore all social boundaries between peoples? Why did the Christian message expand so rapidly beyond the Jewish world? What boundary lines exist today between peoples, and how would Jesus deal with such boundaries?

Deacons’ Doings

RPC has 18 deacons and one youth deacon. The mission of the Deacons is to bring the compassion of Christ to those in need. Whether they be church members (needing rides to church, visits when sick, or the service of the Lord’s Supper), or non-church members (needing food, clothing, housing, safety, etc.), deacons bring hope and joy to those in need. On March 5, the Deacons will be sending three representatives (Noemi Sanchez, Colleen Muller, and Marilyn Slanec) to the [LEAD training](#) meeting for the Chicago Presbytery.. The Deacons are currently considering various fundraising options to help them fulfill their mission. Also discussed at their February meeting was the possibility of reinstating the “Caring Van” program (a church van used in the past to transport elderly members and those without transportation to church every Sunday). This service was stopped due to high costs and a lack of volunteers.

From the Membership Committee

Recently, a friend of mine, an associate presbytery executive, made anonymous visits to congregations in his presbytery. He visited churches of all sizes, urban and rural. He says that his experience in most churches was that no one spoke to him beyond a quick morning greeting. No one asked his name, introduced themselves, or invited him to join the congregation for fellowship following worship.

In a time when congregations are growing smaller and smaller and every church wants to know what they can do to attract new members, this is a disturbing report. Unless members greet and welcome the stranger, the guest, on that very first Sunday, chances are he or she is not going to come back for the second try. Welcome is not something you hang on a banner out front; it is something you do.

Editor Amy G. Oden, in her book *And You Welcome Me*, used church documents to identify characteristics of the hospitality that these pilgrimages and monasteries provided. She identified four steps in hospitality practices. Welcome began when the guests arrived and included a warm greeting and words of welcome. Next the host provided for the immediate needs of the guests such as washing road-tired feet and offering food. It could also include the offer of clothes or a blanket and a chance to rest.

In these monasteries, guests were welcomed into full membership of the community. They entered into the worship, work, and meals along with the members of the community. Guests were given all the resources and protection of the monastery; everything that belonged to the community was made available to the guest.

Finally, when it was time for the pilgrims to depart, they were given food and travel supplies, a blessing for the journey, and clear directions to the next stop along their journey.

The ancient practices of hospitality can guide today's churches as they seek to welcome the strangers who come through their doorways. Congregations can begin by understanding that the newcomers are their guests and resurrecting the traditions of welcome. — Nancy Ferguson from *The Presbyterian Leader*
