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


Open Door Policy

I have written this before, but it bears repeating. There should be no obstacle, no hesitancy, on the part of any parishioner to contact me and request an office appointment or a home visit or just a phone call. It always breaks my heart to hear that someone wanted to talk but didn't do anything about it.

If you had an ache in your body, you would contact your physician and make an appointment. You wouldn't wait at home with your ache and hope that your physician would somehow "just know" that you needed medical aid.



that we sometimes call "ambulance-chasers," but that is a very derogatory term. We tend to have a negative impression of professionals who initiate contact, rather than simply serving when called.



Of course, the ambulance-chaser is a complete stranger, while the Christian parishioner has already taken the initiative to join a church—to acknowledge a certain pastor-parishioner relationship. So, it really shouldn't be considered an "intrusion" to have a pastor call to check up on you. However, I have had many such reactions in the past. In my first year in ministry, a parishioner told me, "if being on a church roster means you're going to just call me out of the blue, then I'll have to delete my name from the roster."

My experience has been that when I initiate contact, the result is often a feeling that I am intruding. However, when the parishioner recognizes a need and initiates contact, we can have extremely productive meetings. This reminds me of the psychologist who will tell you, "unless the alcoholic first acknowledges that there is a need for help, it is pretty much impossible to offer help."

The issue is complicated by the fact that hospitals used to call pastors and tell them whenever a parishioner was hospitalized. Since the change in the privacy rules a few years back, no such calls are now made. The residual difficulty is that parishioners still retain the sense that a pastor ought to "just know" when there is a need, though the mechanism for that is now gone.

The truth is, I now initiate very few contacts. A great many parishioners contact me, set up appointments, seek visits, etc., and this is very gratifying—to know that they value my thoughts. And I give those visits my fullest and best attention since they are so productive. Although, this often requires me to work five or six evenings per week. So, at the ends of those days, I don't frequently find myself wondering, "who else *might* want to speak with me?"

The bottom line is, if you want to talk, please call, or email or drop in. I enjoy serving God by serving God's children.

July 3 1 Kings 3:3-28 "Having a Hearing Heart" Guest Preacher Rev. John Hays will lead worship today, and we will celebrate communion.

July 10 *Matthew 13:1-9, 18-23* "Bearing Fruit" What is the goal of the Christian gospel? Is it a passionate emotional feeling of love? Is it an intellectual understanding and clarity of belief? Or is it a changed life that works for God's purposes? Today we will have a multi-part skit instead of an ordinary sermon. We will also ordain some new officers.

July 24 *Genesis* 29:15-28 "Blessing of the Animals" The way that humans treat other humans is sometimes very much like the way we treat animals. We may like to suppose that we are so very different from animals, but we are just one species of animals. Today we will worship outdoors and we will bless the animals who come to worship with a brief prayer and laying on of hands. If it rains, please do not bring animals, as we will move worship indoors.

July 31 *Matthew 14:22-33* "Walking on Water" How does this story make sense if the boat is understood as a metaphor for the early church? What does it take for a Christian disciple to be able to "walk on water?" What kinds of resistances are there to leaving the boat? How do our current building construction plans fit into this story?

Session News

In June the Session:

- approved a loan from the Endowment Fund to the RPC Operating Fund, not to exceed \$35,000, to finance the construction of handicap-accessible bathrooms.
- welcomed Evaine Stahrr as the Assistant Girls' Group Advisor; the search continues for the Advisor.
- received with regret the resignation of Tricia Willinger from the Board of Deacons and will present the name of Susan Zander to fill the vacancy at the June 19 Congregational Meeting.
- scheduled the "Blessing of the Animals" worship service to be held outdoors on July 24.
- noted that the statements of giving, which will be mailed shortly, will include a reminder to those who have not yet reimbursed RPC for the \$30.31 per capita assessment paid on their behalf to Presbytery.
- thanked Jon Jansky for making a Cross for the Prayer Garden.
- recommended an article, "What Presbyterians Believe" in the magazine *Presbyterians Today* which is available in the church library.
- approved a request from Rev. Jansen to participate in a civil union ceremony to be conducted by another pastor.
- received the final version of the new RPC policy, "Services on the Occasion of Death" which details procedures, policies, and fees for funerals and memorials.
- commended Jim Sit for his work repairing the RPC steeple speakers and recording music played by our Bell Choir which will be played at 6:00 p.m. daily, with other music continuing at noon and 3:00 p.m.

Our camp was located in a canyon in the Black Hills National Forest, so it was a wonderful setting to enjoy God's amazing beauty. We took a breathtaking hike to the top of a hill overlooking the canyon. On our drive home, we stayed at First Presbyterian Church in LaCrosse, Wisconsin, another church which welcomed us with open arms. They served us a delicious barbeque supper upon our arrival. Thanks to volunteer leaders George Dluhy, Connie Kelly, Vince Pecis and Youth Advisor Tara Gregus for leading our group. A good time was had by all and we're already thinking about next year!

Stonewall Jackson was a devout Presbyterian (and CALVINIST in his outlook), and perhaps filled with contradictions – a Confederate General who, before the war while teaching at the Virginia Military Institute, taught a Sunday school class for slaves. What Presbyterians Believe

Have you ever wondered why we ask for forgiveness of our debts rather than trespasses or sins when reciting the Lord's Prayer? Or what Presbyterians believe about eschatology? (Do you even know what eschatology* is?) The answers to this and hundreds of other pieces of information about *What Presbyterians Believe* may be found in a recent edition of *Presbyterians Today* titled "What Presbyterians Believe." * The word *eschatology* is derived from two Greek words meaning *last* and *study* ($\xi \sigma \chi \alpha \tau \sigma \zeta$, last; and $\lambda \sigma \gamma \alpha$, lit. discourse). It is the study of the end of things, whether the end of an individual life, the end of the age, or the end of the world. Broadly speaking, it is the study of the destiny of man as it is revealed in the Bible.

Presbyterian Disagreements 101


Every church has differences of opinion (see *1 Corinthians*). But different churches have different strategies to manage differences. Some churches are very hierarchical. A few elite leaders make the decisions, and the followers are expected to obey. They may not agree, but they have no power to alter the decisions, so they just go along with their church, quietly. Other churches are entirely congregational. Whatever the majority of the members say is final. The drawback is that the congregation can ignore the wisdom of the Holy Spirit that is given to the billions of Christians outside of that church.

Presbyterians are in between. We recognize the Holy Spirit's connection to everyone, but we also recognize that everyone is a biased, fallible sinner. Thus, the best way to discern God's will is to listen to the Spirit's wisdom as broadly as possible. The minority must continue to raise their voices, since the church has frequently listened to the minority and changed its position. The majority must be humble about their discernment, since many majorities have been reversed in the past.

On the hundreds of issues our church has considered, any individual will be in the majority on many and in the minority on many. Where you are in the minority, you submit, but seek to persuade others to change. Where you are in the majority, you rejoice, but also listen humbly. That's being Presbyterian.
