My Favorite Cure for Depression

I just read another article in a long string of articles arguing that conditions such as depression (or addiction, or ADD, or bipolar disease, etc.) are simply a matter of “bad” chemicals in the brain. And my reaction is that the article only tells half the truth.

I certainly agree that bad chemicals in one’s brain can result in mental illness. But I want to discuss two other (seldom mentioned) portions of the truth. First, bad chemicals in the brain are produced by the brain itself (not by some alien being). The most important determiner of which chemicals are produced by one’s brain is... one’s own willful choices.

Secondly, if the *only* problem were bad chemicals in the brain, then just adding some good chemicals to neutralize those chemicals should always “cure” a person. However, experience shows that such people are rarely cured by chemicals, and that there seems to be some other force (volition) that “resists” the good chemicals.

The church has traditionally taught that we are responsible agents—that we reap what we sow, that the choices of good and evil are laid before us, that we can follow the wide path or the narrow path. Modern theologians have recognized that volition is only a portion of the truth—that there are also chemicals and genetics involved. But, I for one do not want to entirely abandon the traditional church teachings. I think there is a balance. Yes, chemicals play a role. But so does free will. We are products of our environment AND we are products of our own choices.

The problem is that the pharmaceutical companies and those who make their living by providing prescriptions have a strong interest in telling only half the story. However, there really isn’t any big money available to tell the other half of the story. Who pushes back against these multi-billion dollar ad campaigns (besides little old me)?

My favorite cure for depression is to prevent it from happening in the first place. And the best way to prevent it is to remain actively engaged in a meaningful community. When you use the talents God has given you in the midst of other people, the endorphins start flowing. God gave you those talents for a reason—to use them for the good of God’s people.

Yes, I know that sometimes we can volunteer for a task at church and discover that perhaps our talents lie elsewhere. Not every effort will be heartily affirmed. But the church is brimming with forgiveness. If at first you don’t succeed, try, try again. I’m sure you will discover your gifts if you persist.

But, when we quit the church committee, stop attending worship, walk away from our church family, etc., the statistical likelihood of mental illness skyrockets. We were made to function in meaningful community, and with the disintegration of the extended family, the church provides the best guaranteed stability for meaningful community.

The officers of the church are *always* recruiting volunteers. Consider calling one and saying, “I want to prevent mental illness—find me something to do at church.” You may save yourself thousands of dollars in drug costs.

Why should we take up an offering to feed the hungry? What if they are hungry because they haven’t worked very much? Should we give away free food to those who are simply lazy? How does God establish justice among us? We will also dedicate the cents-ability hunger offerings in worship this week.

September 25 *Matthew 21:23-32* “Walk Your Talk”

Is God more interested that we say all the right things, or that we do all the right deeds? Is being a Christian more about saying “I love Jesus” or is it more about following the way of life that Jesus exemplified for us? Today we will also ordain Laura Vanags to serve as a new elder and we will also celebrate a baptism.

Session News

In August, the elders and deacons met jointly to discuss items of mutual concern and to share their hope for the church:

- ◆ concern for the YTD budget deficit, which is nearing \$50,000
- ◆ concern that fewer than half of RPC members make financial pledges
- ◆ concern that average giving per member is approximately half of the national average
- ◆ hope that non-participating members would re-engage with their church family
- ◆ hope that there would be more outreach to college/post-college members
- ◆ hope that there would be more outreach to the community
- ◆ hope that members would feel a deeper commitment to the work of RPC
- ◆ hope that there would be more participation by members in worship services

At the regular August meeting, the Session reviewed portions of the new Form of Government for the Presbyterian Church (USA), which went into effect on July 10 after approval by more than one half of the 173 presbyteries. Some of the highlights that affect RPC:

- ◆ each congregation must set the quorum for congregational meetings. *RPC bylaws provide for our quorum as the moderator, a secretary, and not less than one-tenth of the members*
- ◆ each congregation can choose its parliamentary authority for congregational meetings. *RPC bylaws already does this, specifying Robert's Rules of Order.*
- ◆ each congregation must provide adequate public notice for congregational meetings. *RPC bylaws require public notice to be given on two successive Sundays.*
- ◆ public profession of faith during worship is now optional. *RPC session voted that "all new members shall be asked to make a public profession of faith during a worship service after their profession/acceptance by session".*
- ◆ details on how to prepare for membership is no longer specified. *The session voted to continue the current procedure of attending an information seminar led by the pastor, presentation to and acceptance by the session, and presentation in worship.*
- ◆ an annual review of membership rolls is no longer required. *The session decided to continue the annual review.*
- ◆ a roll of inactive members is no longer required and each session is to decide how to maintain contact with members who have moved or drifted away from the church. *The Session approved a procedure for contacting members who have intentionally not participated in the work and worship of the church for one year, in an effort to restore them to full fellowship and to explain the requirements of active membership. After two years of inactivity, the Session, at their discretion, may remove a member from the roll.*

The session also authorized the Trustees to borrow an additional \$10,000 from the Endowment Fund, which will complete the funding needed for the construction of the handicapped-accessible bathrooms.

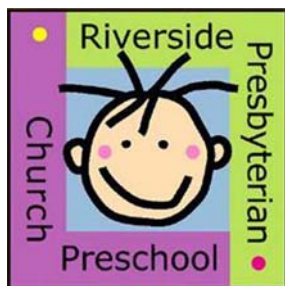
Test of Faith: Ruth

Members Matter

As Christians, we are members of God's household ([Ephesians. 2:19](#)) called to function, participate, and minister in a particular place within the body of Christ. A healthy body requires that each member do its part well. A healthy church requires the same: members who are sacrificially committed and well-equipped to do the works of service that God has prepared in advance for us to do ([Ephesians. 2:10; 4:12](#)).

Many see membership in the church as similar to membership in other community organizations...the Swim Club, Lions, or Chamber of Commerce. The Bible speaks of the church as a family, or the household of God. Church membership is not like joining a country club; it is about joining an organic family. Being a member of Riverside Presbyterian Church really *is* about being part of a family. Members are the people who celebrate with you, grieve with you, have differences and yet look past them.

The church is called the "Body of Christ" in the New Testament, and you don't just casually amputate a thumb. In fact, if the thumb is hurting the whole body goes to its aid. This metaphor shows the commitment, the accountability, and the interdependence of the church. At RPC, as in every church, *Members Matter*.

Just over 50% of our members are doing the work of the Body of Christ. Nearly 50% are not. That means we're missing not only a thumb, but perhaps an entire hand, some hearing, mobility, capacity to breathe and to think. The Book of Order defines active members as those who have been "received into membership of the church and who are active in the church's work and worship." The Membership Committee has a goal for this school year. It is to have 100% of members meet this definition. This will most certainly vary from person to person as each member provides some aspect of **time, talent, and treasure**.

Time: One's responsibility for time commitment in the church should be whatever is necessary to develop the relationships required to minister to others in the church according to one's calling by God. We do not all have the same gifts, roles, or callings, so the time required to be faithful to these varies from person to person. **What one way can you minister to others in the church?**

Talent: Support of the church is to be exercised in part by ministering to others in what amounts to a body; we all have responsibility to minister to and serve one another in terms of distinct and varying gifts with which the Holy Spirit has endowed each individual (*Romans 12:3-8; I Corinthians 12:4-31; I Peter 4:8-11*). **Are you able to sing, bake, recycle, teach, clean...?**

Treasure: Obviously, financial and other resources are needed to carry on the ministry of the Church. *Will you start to pledge, fulfill your pledge, pay your per capita, donate to a special project?*

Imagine what RPC would look like if 100% of our members participated in the church family. That image shows that *Members Matter*.

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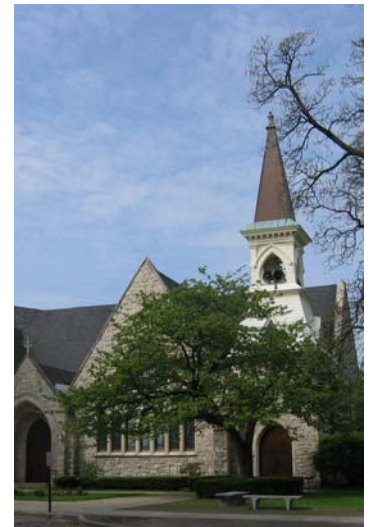
