## My Stewardship Story

Everyone's story is unique. Thanksgiving is a time for sharing our reasons for being thankful. We usually keep our stewardship stories private, but that's probably not healthy. From Moses' day until just a few centuries ago, believers gave the "first fruits" of their harvest and their flocks and herds. Very little was given "privately." So, maybe it's best to share some of these stories publicly.



At the age of twenty-two, I felt God luring me toward a more meaningful life, and I was thankful, so I became a Christian. The church told me that a ten percent pledge was expected, so I went along with what I was told. Shortly after that, I felt the call to go into full-time ministry. So, I quit my job as a programmer and entered seminary. Ten percent of zero was not hard to manage, so I continued to "tithe" during seminary.

After seminary, I had lots of student loans and debts, and I found that my new profession paid about one third of my former salary. So, when I prayed about stewardship, I said to God, "you know, I've already given up two thirds of my former salary for you—how much more do you want?" In my first few years of ministry, I really gave very little to the church—probably only about two percent.

Since then, my salary has been growing steadily, and the memory of my computer programming days has dimmed to oblivion, and my prayers about stewardship have shifted. With my seminary loans now paid off, and with my salary level somewhere near what a high school teacher earns, I'm in a new chapter of my stewardship journey.

I recently attended a national webinar regarding stewardship, where the experts said that a pastor *should* be earning roughly what a local high school teacher earns—adjusted for years of experience and graduate degrees. This made me feel like what I have "given up" for God has diminished over time, and I really should be getting back to tithing. I have been moving slowly in that direction over the past twenty-five years, but this year, I am making a commitment to donate ten percent of my salary to God's ministries.

The Bible says that where your treasure is, there your heart shall be also. I hope that someday when I speak with my Creator about my stewardship decisions over the years, God will understand my reasoning and find my heart to be acceptable. I do know that the best way to improve your relationship with God, to feel a more near presence of God in your life, is to increase what you sacrifice for God's sake. That can take the form of time, talents, or treasure. And I also feel that God has already richly rewarded me for my sacrifices.

So, if you have a thanksgiving story to tell about your stewardship journey, I hope you'll let me know and we can print it in a future Vision. When we share our stories, we learn from one another and encourage one another.

## Session News

In October, the Session:

- ◆ authorized investigating the possibility of establishing a paper recycling center at RPC as an ongoing income-producing project;
- ◆ transferred Brian and Lisa Freel to inactive status, at their request;
- ◆ removed Judy Nowak from the rolls, at her request;
- ◆ learned that the arrangement with Pro Se Services for food distribution at RPC is in dramatic need of restructuring; the Deacons are considering ways to continue this outreach;
- ◆ continued to discuss if applause is the appropriate response by the congregation to musical presentations by youth during worship and referred the matter to the Worship & Music committee;
- ◆ reviewed plans for the fall Stewardship Campaign and Capital Fund Drive, “RPC Matters”. Members who do not return their pledge cards by November 13 will be contacted personally;
- ◆ learned that the YTD deficit is \$43,000, with receipts continuing to be less than budgeted, and disbursements as budgeted.

## There Are No Perfect People

There's a funny story about a man who was rescued on a deserted island by the Coast Guard. The Captain saw three huts on the island and so he asked the man, "What's that hut on the north side of the island?" The man answered, "That's my house. That's where I live." "Okay, what's the hut on the east side of the island?" The man replied, "That's my church. It's where I worship God." "Okay," the captain replied, "I get that. But, what about that third hut?" "Oh," said the man, "That's where I used to go to church!"

It's funny because most of us have been there.

When I was right out of seminary, looking for a call to a church, one of my friends challenged me. He said, "Joe, if you find the perfect church, don't go. Because as sure as you show up to a perfect church, you'll ruin it!" His point was there are no perfect churches because there are no perfect people.

Today, if you have a church family, give thanks and pray for it. Pray for the pastors and leaders. Pray for the congregation and ask God to bless the ministry there. If you don't have a family of faith, ask for God's leading. Remember that spiritually we don't get very far alone.

And finally, if you have been hurt by someone in the church, I pray for God's healing and peace. I pray that you would not confuse the church with God, and end up walking away from both. Instead, may you keep your heart open, because God is always doing something new – even in us.

Our prayer was written in the early 1600's by Rev. William Laud – then the Archbishop of Canterbury:

**Let us pray:** Gracious God, we pray for your holy. . . church. Fill it with all truth in all peace. Where it is corrupt, purify it; where it is in error, direct it; where in anything it is amiss, reform it. Where it is right, strengthen it; where it is in want, provide for it; where it is divided, reunite it; for the sake of Jesus Christ your Son, our Savior. Amen.

This piece is from Dial Hope, a phone-in and internet daily message started by former RPC pastor Roger Kunkel. As membership chairperson, it spoke to me. I hope all members reflect on this passage and re-commit to our spiritual home. – Lynda Nadkarni

## Daniel and His Many Tests of Faith




### Preview of Razing Hell

On December 11 & 18, Pastor Scott will present a Human Scene class on Sharon Baker's book, *Razing Hell*, which challenges Christians to rethink their traditional views of hell and/or eternal punishment and invites them to consider an alternative that is more consistent with the revelation of God in the life and teachings of Jesus Christ. Baker believes eternal hell – the belief that God would punish without end those who have rejected him in time – is one of the most disturbing notions in Christianity. Therefore, she asks us to join her on a quest for a new view of hell that permits us to affirm with Scripture that, while nothing impure will enter the gates of God's holy kingdom (*Rev. 21:27*), there still will be a day when "at the name of Jesus every knee will bow... and every tongue acknowledge that Jesus Christ is Lord (*Phil. 2:10-11; see also Rom. 14:11*)."


