Living as a Christian Today

In April, I will launch a small group ministry, also known as a “covenant group,” that will explore the question, *How do I live as a Christian in today’s culture?* Many have asked about covenant groups and been hesitant to commit to something that is not entirely understood. So, here is how this will work.

The brave adventurers in this new group will begin by affirming a covenant with one another. The covenant will involve issues of confidentiality, tolerance, respect, listening, mutual leadership, etc. The members of this covenant group will then sign up to host future meetings in their own homes. We will rotate from home to home, partly as a way of getting to know each other better.

After our initial orientation meeting in my home, we will embark on our explorations. Each week, a new leader will step forward to facilitate the meeting. The leader for the day will choose the discussion topic, write down two or three discussion questions, and ensure that the covenant rules are followed during the actual discussion.

The topics to be chosen should fit under the general category of how one lives as a Christian in today’s culture. So, a leader might choose, for example, immigration, or gambling, or abortion, or foreign war policy, or how much to coddle grown children, or the pros and cons of home schooling, or whether or not a parent should ever spank a child, etc., etc. The leaders also come to the meeting armed with two or three questions that are open-ended and non-judgmental.

We begin each meeting with prayer and a brief check-in. Then, we engage in a process called “mutual invitation.” The leader begins by answering the first question, and then inviting someone else to share an answer. That person then either answers the question, or says, “I pass,” and after that, invites someone else to share. You only share when you are invited. Otherwise, you listen. When everyone has shared (or passed) for the first question, the leader then poses the second question and the process is repeated.

After all the formal invitations have been answered, there is a time of “free-for-all” where covenant group members can respond to one another and engage in less formal conversation, until the allotted time is elapsed. Then comes a closing prayer, some cleanup, and goodbyes.

I will be leading the initial covenant group myself to get everything established on the right foot. But, I imagine that it will not take long before I am just another member of the group. I envision the initial group happening on Friday evenings after supper, but that may change depending on who signs up.

So, now that you know what I am talking about, please let me know if you are interested in being a part of our initial venture.

Worship

April Worship Schedule

April 1 (Palm/Passion Sunday) *Mark 15:1-39* “The Power of Love” The service begins with palms waving and choirs processing. Then we transition to a Passion Sunday emphasis. Who has power in this story, and how do the various characters apply their power? Is the struggle better understood as Jews *vs.* Christians, or as those with coercive/worldly power *vs.* those without such power? If Jesus had utilized coercive power to his private benefit, would the same people be able to relate to him later? We also have communion today.

April 5 (Maundy Thursday at 7:00 p.m.) A Tenebrae service—a somber service of lessons and music with brief congregational discussion of each lesson and with extinguishing candles. No kids’ sermon today. We will celebrate Communion by intinction in the round, but the service will get darker and darker as we proceed—literally. The service ends in darkness and silence.

April 6 (Good Friday) There will be one Ecumenical Worship Service at St. Mary Catholic Church at noon, featuring the *Seven Last Words of Christ* interpreted by seven area preachers. To join the ecumenical music efforts for the day (instrumental or vocal), please contact Father Michal Lewon (708-447-1020) for further instructions.

April 8 (Easter Sunday) Worship Services at 9:00 a.m. and 10:30 a.m. (no Sunday School today). *Mark 16:1-8* “Is Resurrection a Pipe Dream?” Why should a rational person believe that there will be some form of life after death? Is this just a pretty story to soothe the uneducated masses, or are there actual reasons to believe that this story might be true? Would God have the means to resurrect someone? Would God have a motive for resurrection? How would you speak with an atheist about Easter?

April 15 (Jazz Sunday) *Psalms 133* and *Acts 4:32-35* “Perfect Family Life” What is the ideal of family life? What social principles prevail within families? How far should we extend these principles? Who should we consider to be “family?” Why do families sometimes become dysfunctional? Andy Tecson leads the jazz band for all the music today.

April 22 *1 John 3:1-11* “Presbyterian Good Works” What is the reason for doing good works? Is it a means to an end? Do our works purchase our way into heaven? Or are the works themselves the ends, and our salvation is the means?

April 29 Today we will have a guest preacher from the Presbytery. More details to be announced.

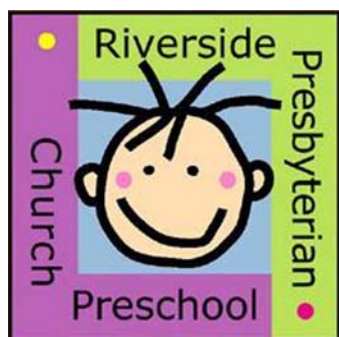
Join Us for Dessert
