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

Election Year Civility for Christians

Now that our election cycle has progressed from competition within one party, to competition across parties, I thought I would share some thoughts on civility. Often we experience someone with a different political perspective doing something we consider "uncivil." Usually this is just a "gut-reaction" judgment. But are there any *objective* standards of civility?



Of course, in a complex landscape such as the United States, there is no sole authority for determining what qualifies as "civil" behavior. But, I do think that Jesus gives us some guidelines that are useful—at least for those who consider Jesus to be an authority. Many of his thoughts on the subject are in *Matthew 18*. What follows are my own personal interpretations of Christ's message in this chapter, as it relates to civility.

Verses 1-14. When we come together for civil discourse, or for any common effort, we should prioritize the goal of taking care of those who are hurting—whatever they may be.

Verses 15-20. We should not gossip about people behind their backs, but seek to correct them in love if we find a fault in them. Gossip has no place in a Christian's life. Correction is intended to lift someone up, not to knock someone down. Likewise, we should not seek to attack someone anonymously, or from a safe distance. We should stand behind our words, openly and plainly—or remain silent.

Verses 21-35. We all make mistakes, so we should approach one another with a readiness to forgive, rather than holding grudges. Forgiveness does not mean that the previous action is forgotten, or that the action has no consequences—it just means that we continue to hope for what is best for the person, even if we have been hurt.

Also in this part, Jesus says we should avoid putting people into categories or classes. The question is not whether a person is socially elite, or from my faction. Civil discourse is not about drawing shady associations between one's adversary and some despised group. We should focus instead on the issues and intended policies of others, so that we may all move forward in as much harmony as possible. Speaking on issues helps us build bridges amongst us; speaking on personalities/factions drives us further apart.

Of course, *Matthew 18* is not the only place in the Bible that discusses civility, and this little summary is not comprehensive. But, I think we would be a whole lot better off if everyone were to act in accordance with these principles. That may sound naïve. You might think—"No one acts that way; it can't be done." Well, I have been in ministry for 25 years and all I can say is that this is the world in which I live (for the most part). The Church is a place where these principles are actually utilized. Maybe the best we can do in civil discourse is to set an example for those outside of the Church. But let us not pretend that Christian behavior is impossible. Perhaps we should invite to church those who do not behave civilly--to join us for some practice.

July 1 • *Mark 5:21-43* • “Communion by Faith” What comes first—evidence or faith? Did the American revolutionaries in 1776 have evidence that freedom would work, or did they have faith? Did his experience in his hometown cause him to want to avoid appearing overly egotistical or self-important? How does this manifest itself in our modern appreciation for democracy?

July 15 • *Numbers 22:20-35* • “Blessing of the Animals” Is God’s love confined to only a small section of the human species, or does God love people of other faiths, and even animals that have no human understanding? What relationship does Balaam’s donkey have with God? Do animals sometimes have a sense of God that we do not have? What can we learn from animals? Today we will have the “blessing of the animals” liturgy.

July 22 • Today will be a congregational *Hymn Sing*. Learn about the stories behind the creating of the hymns and let everyone know which are your favorites.

July 29 • Guest Preacher Tom Coffey, a deacon at St. Mary Catholic Church, will lead worship today.

Session News

- ◆ noted with sadness the death of Drew Smith on June 13;
- ◆ decided to eliminate an annual joint meeting with Deacons since it is no longer a requirement; such meetings can still be called if the need arises;
- ◆ decided to continue with maintaining a register of marriages performed at RPC or by the pastor elsewhere, but not to continue with a separate register of deaths, since that information is already noted in the membership records;
- ◆ approved the transfer of funds from a non-interest bearing loan (from the endowment) to zero out a different interest-bearing loan which was for the purpose of completing the handicapped-accessible bathrooms;
- ◆ stressed the need for RPC members to keep current with their pledges to the capital improvement fund as well as their general budget pledges;
- ◆ congratulated Rev. Jansen on the 5-year anniversary of his pastorate at RPC, the 20th anniversary of his ordination, and his 25th wedding anniversary!;
- ◆ requested a clarification from the Trustees on the urgency to restore the Rose Window, which would be the next capital project to be started. Sufficient funds are not currently on hand to begin this work;
- ◆ noted that the Lord's Supper will be served by intinction in July, August, and September;
- ◆ decided not to opt out of the Board of Pensions' health insurance plan, which now covers the dependents of pastors in a legal civil union.

Night Ministry News

RPC has been preparing and serving meals to the homeless as part of [The Night Ministry](#) program since 2003. In that time, we have served 18,000 meals to the folks who obtain services from The Night Ministry (TNM) bus on the second Friday of each month in the Uptown neighborhood. Sadly, we have received notice from TNM that economic constraints are causing them to discontinue their ministry Friday through Sunday, effective immediately. They have been dipping into their reserves for several years to maintain continuous 365-day service and can no longer afford to do so. The Night Ministry buses will still be operating Monday through Thursday and need congregational support for food ministry. RPC is investigating the feasibility of food prep/service participation on one of those nights each month, depending on The Night Ministry's needs and the location of service. Bright and early on June 8, 16 high schoolers and 4 adult leaders departed Riverside for Mobile, Alabama for the Government Street Presbyterian Church's Urban Mission Camp. We drove to Decatur, Alabama the first day and were treated to a delicious spaghetti dinner by the wonderful folks who hosted us at the Westminster Presbyterian Church. The second day we made a stop in Montgomery and saw the Dexter Avenue Baptist church where Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. preached from 1954 to 1960, and visited the Civil Rights Memorial Museum, which was interesting and moving.

The work we did in Mobile was spending time with poor children, developmentally disabled adults living in group homes, the homeless, women recovering from addictions, and others who were down and out. RPC should be very proud of its teens. They were caring, compassionate, welcoming, warm and open. In our daily devotions, they shared how much they had been touched by those they had met. We served breakfast to the homeless of Mobile and had Bible study with them. Our teens were impressed with how well the men at Bible study knew the scriptures. We stayed at a beautiful facility owned by the Presbytery of Alabama called Baytreat and were treated to some gorgeous sunsets. We also had lots of fun playing games. It was another great trip. A HUGE thank you to the tireless efforts of the adult leaders--Lisa Marciak, Fred Mitchell, Brooke Schwarz and Tara Gregus. If you couldn't make it on this year's trip--we hope to see you next year!

Tickets will be available for purchase in July following church and from the church office, as well as at the event. Tickets are \$5 each (children 5 and under are free).




Italian Dinner and Auction . . . *Make me an offer I can't refuse*

What is the origin of the donkey and elephant as the symbols of the Democratic and Republican parties in America?

The Donkey—Presidential candidate Andrew Jackson was the first Democrat ever to be associated with the donkey symbol. His opponents during the election of 1828 tried to label him a "jackass" for his populist beliefs and slogan, "Let the people rule." Jackson was entertained by the notion and ended up using it to his advantage on his campaign posters. But cartoonist Thomas Nast is credited with making the donkey the recognized symbol of the Democratic Party. It first appeared in a cartoon in Harper's Weekly in 1870, and was supposed to represent an anti-Civil War faction. But the public was immediately taken by it and by 1880 it had already become the unofficial symbol of the party.



The Elephant—Political cartoonist Thomas Nast was also responsible for the Republican Party elephant. In a cartoon that appeared in Harper's Weekly in 1874, Nast drew a donkey clothed in lion's skin, scaring away all the animals at the zoo. One of those animals, the elephant, was labeled "The Republican Vote." That's all it took for the elephant to become associated with the Republican Party.
