Sleep and Resurrection

March is a wonderful month outdoors. Hibernating animals arouse from their slumber. Trees start to bud and leaf out. Wild flowers pop up in unexpected places—sometimes right through the snow. Birds are busy forming new nests for their chicks. In many ways, death is replaced with life.



“Death” takes on many different shades in nature. Physical death is just an opportunity for certain basic forms of life to begin again. As one Disney film put it, we are all a part of the “circle of life.”

In one meaningful way, we experience “death” every day—we fall asleep. While we sleep, there is no conscious awareness that we exist. The Bible speaks frequently of death as a kind of “sleep.”

When I wake up in the morning, it is as if a new life comes (back) into existence. Your life is not one continuous stream of consciousness, but rather a series of discontinuous segments of consciousness. And yet, we remember well what happened yesterday—we remember it as if it happened to “me.”

Death is such a fearsome force, we often deny death and pretend that it does not pertain to us. So, it is especially difficult to view natural sleep as a kind of “death.” Our bias is not to be associated with death in any way, so such an acknowledgment sets off a natural fear response. But if we overcome that fear, recognize that death is a part of life, and acknowledge that death is unavoidable, perhaps we can acknowledge our daily sleep as a kind of foreshadowing of our death.

If I read a chapter of a book today, I will remember it tomorrow and be able to connect it to the chapter I read then. In a way, everything that I do and experience today is “deposited” into a soul that “dies” when I sleep and is resurrected when I wake. It is the accumulation of all those “deposits” that makes me who I am.

Where is our soul (our memories, passions, values, personalities, etc.) “stored” while we sleep? Perhaps the data is all encoded in our brain cells. But I also believe that everything we experience is a shared experience with God—God knows everything we’ve ever thought or done.

The Christian gospel claims that death is not the end of us. We know that sleep is not the end of us. We have confidence that we will awaken in the morning. This confidence was itself deposited into our souls by previous segments of consciousness as they experienced awakening. But Christians also believe that the deposits we make along the way into God’s memory banks will be remembered by God for all eternity. The message of Good Friday and Easter is that we are **loved** by One who has received the “deposits” of all that we are. Therein lies our hope.

Worship

March Worship Schedule

March 3 ▪ *Luke 13:1-9* “Repentance” Repentance means to “turn around.” We often focus on the sins from which we are turning away, but perhaps it is wiser to focus on the goodness toward which we are turning. How do we “redeem the time” that we have been given? Is this something done in one holy moment, or is it something that takes place over a lifetime? We will also celebrate Holy Communion on this day.

March 10 ▪ A guest preacher from the Chicago Presbytery will be preaching this day while Scott is away on Continuing Education leave at McCormick Seminary.

March 17 ▪ *Philippians 3:4b-14* “Confirmation Sunday” Today’s “sermon” will focus on what issues of faith are most pressing for our confirmation class of 2013. They will also be received as new members during worship.

March 24 ▪ Palm Sunday ▪ *Luke 19:28-40* “Praising Jesus as Civil Disobedience” Why were the Pharisees upset that people were praising Jesus? What effect does it have in our lives if we offer praise to Jesus? Should we still be praising Jesus, even after all these years? Today is Palm Sunday and we will celebrate with traditional Palms waving and children singing.

March 28 ▪ Maundy Thursday at 7:00 p.m. ▪ A Tenebrae service—a somber service of music and lessons with brief congregational discussion of each lesson and extinguishing candles. No sermon nor kids’ sermon today. We will celebrate Communion by intinction in the round, but the service will get darker and darker as we proceed—literally. The service ends in darkness and silence.

March 29 ▪ Ecumenical Good Friday at noon at Christ Community Presbyterian Church of North Riverside. All pastors who are members of the Covenant of Churches are invited to share in the preaching of very brief homilies for this ecumenical service. March 31 ▪ Easter Sunday ▪ Worship Services at 9:00 a.m. and 10:30 a.m. (no Sunday School today). *Luke 24:1-12* “Spices for the Dead” The women brought spices to anoint the dead body of Jesus, but they could not find the body. What did they do with the spices? Why do we try to “pretty up” dead bodies today? Is death something to avoid at all costs, or something to embrace with joy?

Kiwiet Memorials to Benefit RPC's Organ

Memorials given in loving memory of John Kiwiet have been designated to the organ fund, specifically to order a bell stop called a *Zimbelstern*. Because John Kiwiet always enjoyed listening to bells played in churches in both Europe and America, the Kiwiet family has decided that the addition of a zimbelstern would be a fitting memorial in honor of John.

The Zimbelstern, meaning "Cymbal Star" in German, is a "toy" organ stop consisting of a metal or wooden star or wheel on which several small bells are mounted. When engaged, the star rotates, producing a continuous tinkling sound. It was common in northern Europe, Germany in particular, throughout the 16th, 17th, and 18th centuries. In some Christian liturgical traditions, it is rung during the singing of the Sanctus or on doxological stanzas of hymns.

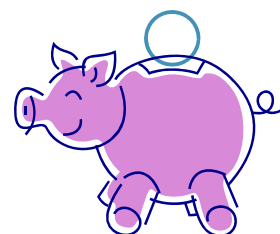

Important Date for all Sunday School Kids: March 3

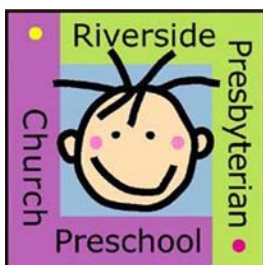

During "FAV" time the girls have the opportunity to run the evening by being the "leader," answering questions about themselves and about their "FAV." Easter Lilies

Lilies are mentioned numerous times in the Bible. One of the most famous Biblical references is in the Sermon on the Mount, when Christ told his listeners: *Consider the lilies of the field, how they grow: they toil not, neither do they spin; and yet . . . Solomon in all his glory was not arrayed like one of these.* According to legend, lilies were found growing in the Garden of Gethsemane where drops of Christ's tears and sweat fell to the ground in his final hours of sorrow. Churches continue this tradition at Easter time by banking their altars and surrounding their crosses with masses of Easter Lilies, to commemorate the resurrection of Jesus Christ and hope of life everlasting.



The Easter Lily industry is an American success story. Prior to 1941, the majority of the bulbs of the *Lilium longiflorum* were imported to the United States from Japan. World War II eliminated the dependence on Japanese-produced bulbs and commercial bulb production shifted to the U.S. Today over 95% of all bulbs grown for the potted Easter Lily market are produced by ten farms in a narrow coastal region straddling the California-Oregon border.

The Easter Lily bulbs are harvested in the fall, packed and shipped to commercial greenhouses where they are planted in pots and forced under controlled conditions to bloom for the Easter holiday. About 11.5 million Easter Lily bulbs are shipped to commercial greenhouses in the United States and Canada per year.

The cultivar most widely grown today for greenhouse potted Easter Lily production is called "Nellie White." This selection was made by a lily grower named James White, and was named after his wife.
