The Vision

Easter and Earth Day

Easter is the celebration of God's power over death. Resurrection changes the way we understand the world, in many different ways. Resurrection gives us hope that the past can be dead and buried and we can begin afresh with a new form of life. Resurrection changes the way that we face our own mortality. Resurrection realigns our morality code during the days before our own deaths.

And yet another Easter implication is connected with Earth Day. To understand this implication, we must ask, What is the basis of God's resurrection power? Resurrection does not arise from what we deserve, or from the laws of physics, or even from God's sense of justice. Resurrection stems from God's love for us. We are not resurrected because of any power that we have. We are resurrected because God's love for us causes God to want to preserve whatever is of value to God.

Yet, when we talk about our relationship with the environment, we often think of the first commandment that God gave to humans, according to Genesis. This commandment says, in essence, "exercise dominion" over the rest of all living things. It is not too controversial to say that humans are supposed to "exercise dominion" over non-human life forms. Most people consider this a joyful blessing rather than a burdensome "commandment" from God.

But the challenge arises from our understanding of the word "dominion." It sounds a lot like "dominate," but it also sounds like the Latin word "Domini" meaning "Lord." In the verse in Genesis immediately preceding the commandment to exercise dominion, we are told that humans are created "in God's image." These two sentences are put together to remind us that when we exercise dominion over others, we are to do so in the exact same manner that God exercises dominion over us.

When we care for non-human life with the same kind of love that God cares for us, then we are exercising dominion in the image of God. God does not consider us humans merely as fuel for worship, like an adoring fan club. Nor are we simply God's resources to be exploited to maximize God's personal happiness. God's dominion over us takes the form of a suffering servant who sacrifices in order to bring us abundant life.

True "dominion" means nurturing, caring, supporting and sustaining. It's like tending a garden—providing water, propping up the wilted plants, pruning what needs to be pruned, etc. That's how God treats us—even when it requires a tremendous sacrifice on God's part in order for us to thrive.

I believe that the very first commandment God gave us should hold a special place of priority among God's commandments. So, when you consider how you should relate to the plants and animals all around us, ask yourself how you would like God to treat you. Only then will you be ready to properly go out and "exercise dominion" in a way that is in the image of God.

April Worship Schedule

April 6 *John 11:1-45* There will be a guest preacher today while Scott is on vacation. We also will celebrate communion today.

April 13 (Palm/Passion Sunday) *Matthew 21:1-13* “Hope and Disappointment” The crowds had great hopes for Jesus. Were their hopes derived from selfishness and peer pressure, or were their hopes derived from the teachings of Jesus? How should we construct proper expectations of God? How do we avoid being disappointed when God’s actions do not comply with our hopes? Today there will be children waving palms, an earlier kids’ sermon, and a nod toward Maundy Thursday service. The service will begin on a “Palm” note and move toward a “Passion” theme.

April 17 (Maundy Thursday) at 7:00 p.m. A Tenebrae service—a somber service of music, scripture lessons and extinguishing candles. No sermon nor kids’ sermon today. We will celebrate Communion by intinction in the round. The sanctuary will get darker and darker as we proceed. The service ends in darkness and silence.

April 18 Ecumenical Good Friday at noon at Riverside United Methodist Church. All pastors who are members of the Covenant of Churches are invited to share in the preaching of very brief homilies for this ecumenical service. To join the Ecumenical music efforts for the day (instrumental or vocal), please contact Dr. Sally.

April 20 (Easter) *Matthew 28:1-10* “A Resurrection Story” The sermon will feature a story of how a woman seeks to “resurrect” her mother after her death. How does a person of strong love cope with one’s inevitable feelings of grief? What does this coping mechanism suggest about God’s love for us? Worship services are at 9:00 and 10:30 this morning.

April 27 *John 20:19-31* “Why Children Ask Questions” Why did Thomas have so many doubts? Was Jesus angry with Thomas for all of his doubts? Why do children ask so many questions? Why do we stop asking so many questions as we grow older? Today will be a celebration of our children, their talents, and their love for God. Second graders (and some third graders) will receive their Bibles. The kids will also contribute liturgy, music and artwork to the service.

Session Highlights

In March, the Session:

- ◆ received into membership the Confirmands: Dima Aieta, Claire Hejna, Jack Jurgens, Samantha Miezio, Elijah Ourth, Adeline Pecis, Caroline Willinger, Brian Wolff and Eric Wolff.
- ◆ denied a request from “Adventures in Creativity” to rent church space for a summer day camp, due in part to concerns over AIC’s probable for-profit status.
- ◆ approved renting the RPC gymnasium to Riverside Recreation Department for a summer program on Fridays.
- ◆ approved a request from the Deacons to develop a 10’ x 12’ vegetable and flower garden on RPC grounds, pending Village approval.
- ◆ approved, with gratitude, a gift from the Jansky family of two angel statues to be placed in the niche above the columbarium.
- ◆ received the final report of the Long Range Planning Task Force and dissolved the group with thanks for their work. A summary of the results of the questionnaire can be found on the following page, and church committees were asked to consider addressing concerns expressed by respondents to the survey.
- ◆ noted that the re-installation of the Rose Window has been delayed due to a backorder on some matching glass.
- ◆ requested that the Trustees calculate the cost per square foot per hour for RPC spaces to aid in determining rates for future rentals by outside religious or charitable groups.
- ◆ noted with sadness the death of Marie Chobot.

Results of RPC 2014 Long Range Planning Survey

Last year, the Session established a Long Range Planning Committee with the mandate “to determine what goals and needs RPC is not adequately addressing and how to implement necessary changes.” Members of the committee included Cindy Gustafson as chair, Tara Gregus, Jim Marciniak, Steve Teune, and Joyce Van Cura. Ellen Hamilton, Keith Pearson, and Dennis Zander also joined the committee early on.

To address this mandate the committee reviewed RPC historical documents including the *RPC Mission Statement*, *2000 Planning Retreat Results and Monitoring List*, *September 2006 Mission Study Report*, and notes from a May 2013 Human Scene presentation. Using this information the committee established categories for programmatic and facility goals: Mission and Outreach, Worship and Music, Physical Facilities and Maintenance, Publicity and Communication, Christian Education, Local and Global Mission, Fellowship and Member Care, and Pledging/Stewardship. With the assistance of Lynda Nadkarni, a survey was developed using “Survey Monkey,” a free survey software program. All church members were encouraged to participate.

Ninety-four people responded to the survey. A variety of ages, most living within three miles of RPC and long-time members of our church, were represented. Programs for Christian education and youth ministry, upgrading our church building to current code, and repairing the church steeple were recommended as high priority goals. Our music program was strongly supported, with a variety of instrumental programming encouraged. It was recommended that we improve our ministry to our homebound and other members unable to attend worship. Renovation of church stained glass windows and our sanctuary organ were not included, as the committee considered those projects already approved by Session. The committee sincerely thanks all participants for giving their careful consideration to the questions and taking the time to complete the survey. Lesson 7: Covenant Living

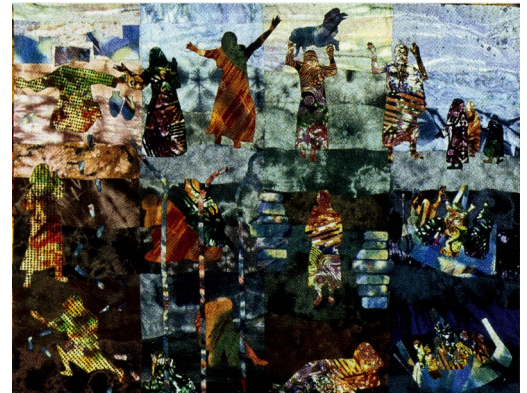
Background Scripture: *Exodus 20-23; Deuteronomy 6:1-9*

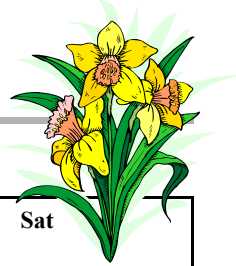
