Service of Worship 7:00 p.m. February 18, 2015

Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of the Lenten season. More and more churches offer a service of atonement on that day. Atonement is the theological concept of what we need to do, or realize, in order to be made right with God. An easy way to think of atonement is **AT + ONE + MENT**, what is needed for us to be at one with God. Another way to think of atonement is as a day when we confess our sins, and make amends to God, others, and ourselves for the way sin has impacted our lives, and the lives of those around us.

Lent is the 40-day period from Ash Wednesday to Easter when we strive to be more contemplative about our need to repent of our sins and become disciplined in how we live out our faith. This Lent, instead of *giving up* something (if that is your custom), I want to urge each of you to *take up* something (or do both!)

For the season of Lent I encourage you to *take up* discipline in your walk with God. The book Celebration of Discipline, by Richard Foster, identifies several spiritual disciplines that help us grow as disciples of Jesus Christ. The Adult Education class, the Human Scene, which meets Sunday mornings at 9:00, will begin using topics from this book February 22.

In addition to the Ash Wednesday worship service, and the adult education program using **Celebration of Discipline**, we will be putting together a *Lenten Devotional Booklet* with readings for each day to guide and encourage your walk of faith during Lent.



RPC Treasurer

RPC Treasurer Fred Kitch was recognized for his seven years of service in this position at a coffee fellowship in January hosted by the Finance Committee. Ellen Hamilton has agreed to become the new Treasurer. Thanks to Fred for his dedication and hard work on behalf of RPC for the past seven years, and thanks also to Ellen for stepping forward to take on this important job.

What is Per Capita?

Every year all Presbyterian congregations in the PCUSA pay "Per Capita" contributions to the larger church. Together with the Per Capita contributions from churches throughout the country, they support the governance work of the presbyteries, synods, and the General Assembly.

In the case of the Presbytery of Chicago, Per Capita goes to:

- Help congregations with pastoral transitions
- Train and support interim ministers
- Resolve congregational conflicts
- Care for ministers and Christian Educators and their families
- Help prepare people for service as ordained ministers

How is Per Capita Determined?

Per Capita contributions are requested from every congregation based on each church's total active membership. This means the rate for 2015 is based on the total number of active members reported at the end of 2013 (417 members at RPC).

For 2015, the Per Capita cost is \$31.23 per member, which goes to:

General Assembly \$ 7.07 Synod of Lincoln Trails \$ 3.81 Presbytery of Chicago \$ 20.35

How much will RPC pay?

In 2015, RPC will pay \$12,741 in Per Capita.

How can I help?

Although \$31.23 is a relatively small amount for each individual, the total cost of \$12,741 is a large amount for the church. You can help by paying your Per Capita cost. It's easy to do online through the RPC website or here:


