To Dream Again

The following excerpt is from *To Dream Again* by Robert D. Dale:

What we expect from life is usually what we get.

In Winnie the Pooh, Pooh and Piglet take an evening walk. For a long time they walk in companionable silence. Finally, Piglet breaks the silence.

He asks, "When you wake up in the morning, Pooh, what's the first thing you say to yourself?"

Pooh responds: "What's for breakfast?"

And then, "And what do you say, Piglet?"

Piglet replies, "I say, I wonder what's going to happen exciting today?"

Friends, small expectations yield meager results! We can choose a 'breakfast dream' or an 'excitement dream.' As we concluded our sermon series on what it means for us to capture the vision that God has for us as a congregation, I invited you to dream. To ask yourself, "What if . . ." What if we had faith that God could make our most wonderful and outrageous dreams come true?

You recently shared your dreams with me and while I do not have space here to share them all, I thought you might enjoy a summary and, who knows, maybe this will spark your imagination, and you will think of a new dream to share.

First, some of you dreamed about upgrades or changes that need to be made the facility. As I said in a sermon recently, some of your hopes and dreams were focused on the building or the manse, and we certainly are responsible for caring for those structures; but friends, those are not the dreams that will lead to a bright growing future. Most of you dreamed about hands-on mission possibilities; these are mission opportunities that require more than merely writing a check. More than one person suggested taking yearly ADULT mission trips to countries such as Africa or Brazil. Four people dreamed of hosting a Soup Kitchen in our very own Social Hall. There was a desire to minister to those who suffer from substance abuse and mental illness. Some of you dreamed of working in our very own mission field, including working with the homeless and underprivileged in the city of Chicago. These mission opportunities seem to take a more hands-on approach than we currently do. They are in many cases the next step from writing a check or bringing a donated item for another church or group to deliver to those in need.

Worship Series

In July, we will begin using a thematic approach to worship. The thematic approach is called a Worship Series. For several Sundays, we will explore a theme or idea with scripture readings expanding on the theme. We will strive for sensory-rich worship, because individuals understand and interact with God, the Holy Spirit and the Word in diverse ways through various sensory experiences.

We will employ a multi-media approach to provide a sensory-rich experience such as continuing the use of flowers and color in the sanctuary, incorporating music, dance, and art, or by engaging the congregation in active participation through writing, moving, or creating.

To aid in creating a multisensory worship experience, the Session has approved placing monitors in the sanctuary. We are seeking donors who are able to give over and above their regular support of RPC. If you would like to help defray the cost of the monitors and their installation, please speak to Pastor Jackson or Susan Lynch, moderator of the Worship & Music Committee.

The Gospel According to Disney Worship

The *Gospel According to Disney* series will explore the role that the animated features of Walt Disney play on the moral and spiritual development of generations of children. If you're under the age of 100, chances are you were once one of Disney's little charges. Fables such as *Bambi*, *Pinocchio*, and *Dumbo* taught generations of children about the importance of honesty and believing in yourself; they oriented children's sympathies toward the underdog and the outcast. The series begins Sunday, July 17.

What are Those Deacons Doing?

Well, we do a lot of things, and one of them is listen to you. In the last church survey a number of people wrote down that RPC should help sponsor a refugee family. For the last 6 months or better, we have done research, had people come to our meetings to speak, sent e-mails, and at our last meeting we voted unanimously to do just what you requested. We have formed a sub-committee, Riverside Refugee Rescue, or R3, to work with and learn from Ascension Lutheran church as they have sponsored refugees previously. In addition, we will be working with the group [Refugee One](#), located on the north side of Chicago. As Dale said in a sermon, it's one thing to write a check, but it's another thing to actively do something. This is just one of the things your Deacons are doing.


