The Vision

August 2016

Why do we have to keep changing?!?!

Why is everything so different?!?!?!

Both are questions that I have heard lately. Actually, I have heard those questions for over 20 years in ministry. Why change? It is simple really; if we do not change we will become obsolete. We change all the time in our lives: we change what we wear; we change what we eat, we change what we drive; and we change our hair. Recently, I came



across an article by Elaine A. Heath, who is the dean of Duke Divinity School. She says: We, the church, have to make a choice day by day to get over ourselves or we will miss God's call. Getting over ourselves means trusting God while we learn new skills that are grounded in ancient wisdom. It means letting go of habits and comfort zones that we label "tradition," but which keep us from embracing the real tradition—aligning ourselves with God in Christ who is making all things new.

We in the church are not necessarily very good at letting go, but if we don't, if we continue to cling to old ways of doing things, we fail our calling to bring about God's kingdom. Heath continues by saying: We are in the middle of rapid, unprecedented culture shifts that are driven by changes in communication and information technology, economics, political upheaval, religious turmoil, and escalating violence. In this context many people in the inherited church live in a state of grief because of the increasing failure of their programs, activities, and worship gatherings to make a difference. What used to work in reaching neighbors with the gospel, no longer does. Because of the anxiety of failure in the system it is increasingly difficult for declining churches to imagine a lively future that looks different from a lively past. The thought of taking risks, of concerning itself more with its neighbors than itself is terrifying to the stuck, backward looking church. This is the church that must now get over itself.

I love the idea that we must get over ourselves, the changes that we must make are not just a worship style. It is not one thing. While many of the communities love ancient, traditional liturgy such as Evensong, and a great many are sacramental, some of them are so loosely organized as to seem scarcely more than a handful of friends, gathered around the Bible and a good craft beer. On the whole there is much more commitment to engage issues of social and environmental justice than is the case in the average inherited church, Heath concludes.

What are Those Deacons Doing?

We all know the story of the good Samaritan, but this past June the deacons took it to a much bigger level. On June 29, the Village of Riverside Police Department, and the Riverside Presbyterian Church held a meeting to bring awareness to the heroin problem in the suburbs. Spearheaded by Steve Marcus and David Harper, the police department was contacted to set up an educational meeting to discuss how heroin is no longer a city problem, but has reached out to the suburbs. There were two items that really caught my attention. Everyone whether they know it or not, knows someone who is taking heroin, or knows a family affected by it. Second, we've all seen police cars that read on the back that this car was purchased by assets seized in drug arrests. That is no longer happening. People are not driving to pick up their drugs, they are using mass transportation. Once the train stops in drug neighborhoods, the buyers are escorted by gang members to and from the train so the heroin can be purchased. It's sad, and it's getting worse. There was a lot of information given, and it is reassuring to know that the Riverside Police department is acting on it. It should also be noted that Diane Chaney was present to answer any medical questions.

CARERS Corner


The First Presbyterian Church of Chicago, along with Woodlawn Ministerial Alliance, started a food pantry in the 1970's. The food pantry and a weekly hot meal program continue to this day, with the support of partner congregations, including our own. These programs meet the needs of 300 people in the Woodlawn community each week. Canned goods needed this August are meat, vegetables and fruit.



Presbyterian Women Donate

The Presbyterian Women donated \$325.60 to the Presbytery Women—Presbytery of Chicago, for four projects that support the critical need for education and healthy environments in the areas they serve:

- A school for girls by *Building Minds* in South Sudan;
- Heartland 180, a core values and life skills training program for at-risk youth in Overland Park, Kansas;
- Habitat for Humanity's repair of manufactured homes in the East Bay and Silicon Valley of California;
- ◆ DART's *Closing Off the School-to-Prison Pipeline Program* in mid-Kentucky, Scioto Valley, the James, Charleston, and Greater Atlanta Presbyteries.



We are halfway though our year of pledges and donations. Between financial donations and donations of time and talent we are doing well. The success of the preschool, youth mission trip and the Vacation Bible School science camp were due to considerable contributions of time, talent and donations. May the second half of the year show even greater commitment to God's work. Thank you all.

Mission Trip

The RPC Senior High youth embarked on their 2016 Mission Trip to Martin County Kentucky with the Appalachia Service Project on a hot and sunny morning on June 25. We trekked to Columbus, Ohio, where we stopped at the Gauen household for food and fellowship, as well as an exercise from ASP designed to prepare us for the trip ahead. We stayed at the First Presbyterian Church of Westerville, Ohio for a night and were treated to breakfast at the church the following morning. We then made the journey down to Kentucky.



What followed was a week of

intense work and labor on two houses in Martin County, Kentucky. We split into two teams, team *Phish Food* and team *Tonight Dough* (named for Ben and Jerry's ice cream flavors, by the way!). Each crew worked on separate projects that included building a new deck, underpinning houses, digging holes, pouring concrete, finishing trim around living rooms, painting, sawing, cutting wood, drilling and doing all sorts of other activities.

We met amazing people as well. We paired with a group from Trumbull, Connecticut, and met two amazing families who welcomed us into their homes for a week. We learned an ASP saying, that the Appalachia Service Project is about relationship building, with home repair on the side.


